

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
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Agency History

The South Carolina Legislature restructured a significant portion of state government in 1993. Effective February 1, 1994, Act 181 created the South Carolina Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation (LLR). This legislation merged the Department of Labor, State Fire Marshal's Office, the South Carolina Fire Academy and 38 professional and occupational licensing boards to form the new agency.

The legislation empowered the Governor to appoint a director of the agency with the advice and consent of the Senate.

LLR is organized into four divisions: Fire and Life Safety, Labor, Professional and Occupational Licensing and Administration.



Mission Statement

Making South Carolina a Safer and Better Place to Work and Live

The South Carolina Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation will accomplish its mission by:

- Promoting a regulatory climate that provides a safe and healthy environment where businesses can be successful in a manner that benefits our citizens;
- Conducting appropriate inspection and complaint investigation programs and, when necessary, pursuing enforcement options as provided by law;
- · Administering licensing, permitting and certification programs, as provided by law; and
- Providing appropriate education, information, and outreach programs.

Accomplishments 1999-00

Division of Fire and Life Safety

Office of State Fire Marshal

- Conducted five State Fire Marshal certification course across the state.
- Entered into the second year of a three-year grant with the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control to conduct fire safety education programs and provide smoke alarm installation in Charleston and Chesterfield counties.
- Completed development of the in-service teacher training videos for the "Freddie" fire safety curriculum for elementary school children.
- Presented a two-day workshop for fire safety educators conveying basic knowledge and skills necessary to effectively deliver safety and survival behavioral messages.
- Distributed 1,200 fire safety videos, "Be Cool About Fire Safety," to requesting fire departments.
- Developed smoke alarm installation and educational program with the Department of Disabilities and Special Needs to reach high-risk families.
- Distributed approximately 70 computers marked for surplus property to encourage participation in the State Fire Incident Reporting System.
- Attended training classes, which included code changes, legal requirements, customer relations and handling of LP gas.
- Expanded engineering staff's role in educating designers, contractors, and local officials about fire protection requirements and methods.

The South Carolina Fire Academy

- Provided 18 one-day instructor updates for the new firefighter curriculum for 361 instructors.
- Conducted 17 Aircraft Rescue Firefighting classes with 236 students. This includes 79 firefighters from across the country trained in our 48-hour IFSAC Certification Course Basic Aircraft Rescue Firefighting.
- Conducted 11 Instructor Methodology Courses yielding 165 new instructors.
- Conducted two Chief Fire Officer Seminars for students.
- Offered one Fire Officer Symposium for students.
- In partnership with the S.C. Society of Fire Service Instructors, co-hosted the annual Instructors' Improvement Conference at the Fire Academy.
- Conducted a special Auto Extrication Seminar for 40 students, specifically dealing with new construction and restraint devices, such as air bags.
- Conducted three seven-week Firefighter II programs, which is an IFSAC-accredited program that meets the NFPA 1001 Standard for Firefighter II.
- Conducted the Annual Southeastern Weekend Fire School with programs for participants.
- Conducted 1,133 programs for municipal departments for 14,641 students and 168 industrial programs for 2,503 students.

Division of Labor

- The Office of OSHA Voluntary Programs established a goal of increasing the number of annual consultative visits to businesses by 25 percent in fiscal year 1999-2000. At the end of the fiscal year, consultative visits were up 40 percent over the previous year. Hazards identified and corrected totaled 8,619, up 33 percent. In fiscal year 2000, OVP consultants saved South Carolina businesses \$6.7 million in OSHA fines, almost double the amount in fiscal year 1999.
- South Carolina continued to lead the nation with the most VPP Palmetto Star sites in any state plan state. The Office of OSHA Voluntary Programs continued to offer regional training programs and on-site consultations free-of-charge to employers across the state.
- The Office of Labor Services continued to educate the public through mail outs, personal contacts and speaking engagements throughout the year. News conferences were held in Greenville with both print and TV media to discuss Child Labor Laws and requirements to further educate the employers of their

responsibilities. The office changed the territory of the investigators to better utilize personnel.

- The OSHA Compliance Section continued to implement its policy not to issue citations for other-thanserious violations corrected during an inspection. This resulted in the immediate abatement of 3,126 violations. The Compliance Section continued to give an additional 15 percent penalty reduction for immediate abatement of serious hazards.
- The Office of Elevators and Amusement Rides produced an amusement ride safety coloring book for children that was distributed at the State Fair in Columbia.
- The Labor-Management Mediation Office is strengthening its relationship with the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service in order to offer better service. The office continues to communicate with employer and union representatives on a pro-active basis during negotiations to offer suggestions and assistance in order to keep work stoppages to a minimum.
- The Migrant and Seasonal Farm Workers Commission continued to distribute to growers, workers, agencies and organizations the video package "Steps to Compliance An Educational Tool for Growers in South Carolina" and "Avoiding Immigration Discrimination in Agriculture." The Commission continues to work with the State Housing Authority and Design Corps on obtaining a HOME grant for migrant housing. Many seminars on housing were sponsored. The Commission continues to update and distribute "South Carolina Migrant Services," a handbook available in English and Spanish.

Division of Professional and Occupational Licensing (POL)

- Employees at all levels in all offices participated in developing the division's strategic plan. The agency goals are to maximize customer and employee satisfaction and more efficiently use resources. Employees have volunteered to serve on action teams to implement the Division's Strategic Plan.
- Four medically related boards support a program aimed at protecting the public through the early identification of health professionals with substance abuse problems. The Boards of Medical Examiners, Nursing, Dentistry, and Pharmacy support the intake, assessment, referral and monitoring components of the Recovering Professionals Program (RPP). RPP is a confidential referral and monitoring program designed for physicians, nurses, pharmacists and dentists with problems related to substance abuse and dependence, or from a dual diagnosis of addiction and mental illness. The goal of the program is to protect the public and to help the professional return to safe practice. At the end of FY2000, the program's enrollment was 210.
- Many boards and agency staff visited professional schools and colleges to speak to graduating classes and other students interested in a given profession. Some boards used the opportunity afforded them at examination time to provide information and answer questions. The Division has prepared a presentation to be used in these and other contacts with potential licensees to provide them with basic information on the licensing process, its requirements, and restrictions and their responsibilities. The presentation is planned to be distributed to schools and colleges outside the state as well, if the number of licensees warrant it.
- Licenses are now issued at exam sites when a cosmetologist or a barber passes the required exam.
- The growth and development of information technology within the POL Division continues to escalate. In a rapidly changing world and technological marketplace, LLR-Administration's Office of Information Services, together with POL Division staff, monitor new and efficient processes and equipment as they evolve. Staff continuously develops and updates consistent methods for data access and maintenance within POL Division program areas. The computer imaging process continues for storage and archival of board records. The Division began plans for the development of a data management system which will also provide for electronic licensing. The public was given greater access to both necessary and desired information through use of technology. A "Licensee Lookup" is now available via the LLR Web site. This addition allows basic licensee information to be available around the clock. Each board's Web page contains not only licensing information, links to legislative documents and links to schools and other organizations but also provides access to forms at any time. Copies of minutes and newsletters are also available on these pages.
- The Pharmacy Board approved electronic transfer of prescriptions between drug stores in South Carolina
 under common ownership and databases. This change makes keeping current with medications easier
 for both citizens of the state and pharmacists.

- The Cosmetology and Barber Boards issue licenses on-site upon successful completion of examinations.
- The Auctioneers Board has adopted a citation process of discipline which increases efficiency, reduces cost and better serves the industry.
- Statutes and regulations were reviewed for compliance with the Agency's legislation. Plans were established to prepare for necessary legislation to be introduced during the session beginning January 2001.

Administration

- The agency head, along with the leadership team, developed a strategic plan for the agency that outlines its vision, mission, core values and divisional strategies.
- Implemented a more meaningful performance management system with a goal of having 100 percent of employees' performance evaluations completed on time. As of June 2000, 100 percent were completed in a timely manner.
- Implementation of cost-saving measures regarding automobiles, beepers and phones which save approximately \$75,000 annually.
- Instituted a new budgeting process that has increased input from managers about the budget process, increased the accountability of agency managers and increased equity in resources across division lines.
- Conducted an agencywide review and examination of systems for processing and acting on complaints made to LLR. Developed recommendations for improvement of the way complaints are processed, investigated, prioritized and documented.

- Developed a Request for Proposal (RFP) to create a data management system for the licensure process as well as exploring e-commerce possibilities.
- The Office of General Counsel drafted proposed Rules of Civil Procedure and Discovery for use by all POL boards. A draft has been circulated for review and comment by these boards, the Administrative Law Judge Division and the South Carolina Bar.
- Decreased process times for invoices and travel vouchers from 30 to six days.
- Completed year with an audit of financial practices for the agency which showed no significant findings and that the agency is in compliance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles. Implemented suggestions provided by the State Auditor's Offices last July.
- Formed a Telephone Task Force to establish standards for the highest level of customer service by:
 - reviewing and analyzing LLR's communication systems to achieve the most efficient and effective communications network possible;
 - establishing standards and unifying telephone practices that best serve the public and employees of the agency; and
 - effectively utilizing our human resources through the implementation of reasonable policies and ongoing training in all areas of customer service.
- Conducted the following on-site programs for our employees:
 - Blood Drives (four)
 - Mammogram Van Visit
 - Health/Benefits Fair
 - South Carolina Retirement Systems Seminar (two)
- Created pages for "The State" newspaper featuring professions offered by the agency's 39 professional and occupational licensing boards and other programs as part of LLR's education initiative. The pages, called Career Close-Up, were written for students in middle and high school to help them choose a career path. Also as part of the career awareness project, a manual highlighting LLR's professions was created, and the agency participated in Ground-Hog Job Shadow Day in February.
- The agency's Web site averaged 1 million hits and 70,000 visits each month. These visitors downloaded an average of 400 documents and performed 50,000 licensee lookups per month.

Public Information

- Along with the OSHA Office of Voluntary Programs, kicked off a statewide media campaign on worker safety called "SafetyWorks!"
- Continued a statewide media campaign to reduce fire deaths under the slogan, "Survivor or Statistic. Get Fire Smart." The campaign included radio and TV public service announcements, bumper stickers and brochures with fire safety messages. The campaign's PSAs earned the office a statewide award from the South Carolina Chapter of the Public Relations Society of America.
- Earned two awards from the South Carolina Press Association for agency newsletters "LLR Times" and "Fire and Life Safety News."
- Produced new brochures, newsletters and other educational materials about agency programs, boards and offices.
- Continued to expand information available to the public through the agency's homepage on the Internet.
- Coordinated all aspects of the agency's booth at the State Fair.

DIVISION OF FIRE AND LIFE SAFETY

The Division of Fire and Life Safety serves as the fire safety focal point for South Carolina, maintaining a statewide delivery system for fire prevention, protection and training services. The division provides leadership, guidance and services needed by the fire service to carry out its responsibilities at the local level. The Office of State Fire Marshal and the S.C. Fire Academy comprise the division.

Responsibilities

Statutory responsibilities for the primary programs of the division are as follows:

Code Enforcement (23-9-10 through 23-9-180):

Charges the State Fire Marshal with responsibilities for requiring compliance with national and state-adopted fire safety codes and standards promulgated by the Division of Fire and Life Safety and the Liquefied Petroleum Gas Board and gives authority to the State Fire Marshal to inspect buildings for codes compliance.

South Carolina Fire Academy (23-10-10):

Charges the Fire Academy with the operation of a training facility to upgrade the state's fire service personnel—paid, volunteer and industrial.

Office of State Fire Marshal

Programs

The Office of State Fire Marshal has regulatory responsibility to ensure compliance with state fire safety regulations. This is accomplished through inspection activities by deputy state fire marshals in the field, code consultation and plans review services provided by the Engineering Services Section. Fire prevention activities aimed at reducing the state's fire death rate are managed by the Public Fire Safety Education Section. Activities include the distribution of smoke alarms, programs in the schools to educate youth and the dissemination of timely fire safety information to the public.

Public Fire Safety Education

"Get Alarmed, South Carolina"

The "Get Alarmed, South Carolina" program is an on-going public fire safety awareness campaign where the main objective is to lower fire deaths by 1) alarming citizens about the fire problem and teaching them about fire safety, and 2) to provide smoke alarms to high risk citizens—the elderly, economically depressed and handicapped.Forty-six county coordinators serve as liaisons to assist in distributing materials and smoke alarms for this program.

School-Based Public Fire Education Curriculum

The "Freddie the Fire Cat" curriculum is a comprehensive fire safety educational curriculum for students in kindergarten through fifth grade. "Freddie's Fire Smart Kids" is a curriculum for kindergarten and first grades. "Freddie's Fire Safety Friends" is an expanded curriculum for second and third grades. During the fall of 1998,

the fourth- and fifth-grade curriculum, "Freddie Gets Fired Up," was piloted and was introduced into the school system during the fall of 1999. To date, more than 245,000 students (out of a possible 299,000) in kindergarten through fifth grade have received vital fire safety and survival education through these programs. The goal is to have a complete program to take to the school system for delivery statewide by the school year 2000-2001. Each curriculum contains lesson plans, student activity workbooks, graduation certificates, a video to coincide with each lesson plan and a storybook introducing "Freddie" and his life story. A video has been produced to accomplish in-service training for teachers to acquaint them with the "Freddie" curriculum.

"Freddie the Fire Safety Cat" is the Office of State Fire Marshal's mascot and is used at various functions by schools, civic groups, churches, government agencies, fire departments, etc. "Freddie," along with educational materials, provides children and adults with a powerful message of being fire safe. The office has two "Freddie" mascot suits.

Fire Incident Reporting

State law requires the division to collect and analyze data on fire incidents. The division does this through a comprehensive National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS) created for fire departments in South Carolina. This system provides accessibility to data and reports which help departments focus on current problems, predict future problems in their communities and measure whether their programs are working. At a broader level, this information aids the state through work with the legislature. NFIRS has been used to justify the state budget and has helped in the passage of important bills on smoke alarms. It also enables the division to provide more accurate statistical information to the national level.

A software package can be obtained from the Office of State Fire Marshal that takes the place of departments sending in fire incident forms. By entering their own reports, the departments can extract statistics to identify their fire problems. The Office of State Fire Marshal trains the departments to use the software and provides troubleshooting as needed. Training is also provided on the fire incident forms. Seventy computers have been distributed to fire departments.

A document describing the fire statistics collected is compiled and printed in a handbook that is distributed to fire departments across the state.

Fire Death Reports

When a fire death occurs in South Carolina, a fire fatality form is filled out by a deputy state fire marshal, a fire chief or sometimes a coroner. Once this form is completed, it is returned to the Office of State Fire Marshal and compiled into a database. These statistics are analyzed at the end of each month to give the total number of fire deaths for the month and for the year to include death by county, cause of death, smoke alarm present, structure that death occurred in and age of the deceased. These statistics are used statewide by the media, fire departments, fire organizations, government agencies, etc.

Fire Safety Materials for Distribution

The office receives many requests for public fire education materials. Coloring books, flyers on smoke alarm maintenance, general fire safety booklets, pencils and stickers are some of the materials sent to fire departments, government agencies, schools, etc. In addition, the office serves as a resource to local fire departments by maintaining a resource center housing videos on various fire safety subjects. They are available on a check-out basis.

Programs and Presentations

Various presentations are given on fire safety throughout the year. The S.C. Department of Disabilities and Special Needs, Carolina Health Care and S.C. Department of Health and Environmental Control's Division of Women and Children's Services are some of the agencies receiving continuous training. In addition to presentations, many programs have been established by partnering with DHEC, such as the "Save Our Children" program, a sub-program of "Get Alarmed South Carolina."

When home health care nurses discover a home without a smoke detector, they call the county coordinator for their area to schedule a visit to the home. Nurses are taught to conduct home fire safety inspections, and

this becomes part of their routine survey.

The S.C. Department of Disabilities and Special Needs contracts with the Office of State Fire Marshal to provide four annual training sessions on fire safety to its staff. The office also trains its staff to provide home fire safety inspections and to install smoke alarms when needed.

The Office of State Fire Marshal also makes presentations and provides displays at annual meetings of state associations including the S.C.State Firemen's Association, S.C. State Association of Fire Chiefs and S.C. Fire Inspectors' Association.

A partnership with the S.C. Safe Kids Coalition enabled the distribution of a fire safety video entitled "Be Cool About Fire Safety" to more than 500 fire departments and schools.

News Releases

Monthly news releases are generated to inform the public on fire education issues such as heating safety and smoke detector distribution. The releases are sent to newspapers and TV and radio stations. Heating safety, holiday safety, dormitory safety and fire prevention week activities are among recent news releases distributed.

Fire Prevention Week and Fair

The Office of State Fire Marshal coordinates statewide fire prevention week campaigns focusing on a specific fire safety topic. The fire service is often involved in activities such as holding exit drills within their communities simultaneously. The office serves as a resource to the general public and the fire service for fire safety materials and presentations.

Television Public Service Announcement

The office routinely works with S.C. ETV to produce public service announcements targeting the need for working smoke alarms in homes. A recent PSA was distributed to TV stations throughout the state to increase the public's awareness of smoke alarms.

Burn Camp

The Office of State Fire Marshal has participated in the Children's Burn Camp of Florida at Walt Disney World since 1995. South Carolina sends burn survivors (children) and buddies. These children are recommended through hospitals and organizations dealing with burned children. The participants are entertained throughout the weekend with no expense to the families. A visit to a major theme park is the highlight of the weekend. Private individuals, fire service organizations and corporations contribute to this cause.

Special Projects

The office participates in several special events each year including the S.C. SAFE KIDS teleconference. South Carolina also has participated in special studies conducted by FEMA to look at Community-Based Fire Education and received a grant to implement such programs. In another study conducted by USFA, South Carolina was identified as one of four states leading the way with effective fire education programs. Partnering with DHEC, a \$150,000 grant dealing with residential fire safety and the installation of smoke alarms was awarded by the Center for Disease Control.

Field Services

The Field Services staff continued to work to improve their inspection skills and overall employee skills. This was done by attending periodic training classes including proper handling of LP Gas, code changes, legal requirements and customer relations.

The deputies were also encouraged to participate in a wide range of other professional association activities, such as attending their county fire chiefs' association and other fire service organizations. They were encouraged to keep these organizations abreast of changes in code and regulations as they occurred.

The staff continues to work to improve the delivery of services to our customers.

Inspections for Codes Compliance

Inspections continue to be one of the core functions. Listed below are some of the activities and inspections conducted by deputy state fire marshals.

Engineering Services

Plans Reviews

The engineering staff provides comprehensive reviews of building designs and building systems to determine compliance with state laws, regulations and codes. These may be plans of state buildings which are referred by the state engineer's office, day care centers referred by the Department of Social Services (DSS), local prisons referred by the SC Department of Corrections, building plans referred by local jurisdictions, and others as required by state law. This service can identify unsafe designs before the building is constructed, resulting in less expensive and often more effective code compliance. The staff's efforts to improve and streamline the review process with fewer delays for the "customer" (owners, designers, contractors) continues. In FY 99-00, 503 projects were reviewed.

Technical Assistance

The staff provides technical assistance to owners, designers, contractors and private citizens, as well as state and local government officials. This assistance is provided through phone conversations, meetings, on-site visits and letters. The type of assistance ranges from simple questions on requirements, to large and difficult fire protection engineering problems that are not specifically addressed by codes. The office maintains a comprehensive and up-to-date reference library for research into the latest opinions and methods of fire protection design. The staff also maintains working relationships with regional and national fire protection organizations. This information base, coupled with a trained staff specializing in all aspects of fire and life safety design, is a resource that is not available anywhere else in South Carolina.

Education

In FY 99-00, the engineering staff continued to expand its role in educating designers, contractors and local officials about fire protection requirements and methods. The staff conducted presentations at seminars and professional association meetings, taught courses and published newsletter articles. The State Fire Marshal's Certification Course student handbook and presentation materials were updated to reflect newly adopted regulations. The State Fire Marshal's Certification Course presentation was put into a PowerPoint format. The target is a proactive approach to fire protection at the local government and contractor levels. This will enable local officials and designers to solve compliance problems at the local level and allow the Office of the State Fire Marshal to provide expertise in situations where it is most needed.

South Carolina Fire Academy

The Fire Academy's mission is to develop an instructional delivery system through which a standardized, statewide firefighter training curriculum is developed and implemented to train a maximum number of career, volunteer and industrial fire service personnel. Services are provided to accomplish the following activities: developing the skills necessary to command and control emergency operations involving fire, rescue and hazardous materials incidents; developing the managerial and leadership skills for all levels of fire service officers; and developing skills in fire department support functions to include public fire education, fire prevention inspections and investigations.

The Fire Academy has three separate program areas: Resident Training; Regional Training; and Curriculum, Instructor Certification and Accreditation. South Carolina has an estimated 800 fire departments with 18,000 paid and volunteer firefighters. Last year, the Fire Academy trained 14,641 public fire service and emergency personnel and 2,503 industrial fire brigade members.

Resident Training

The Fire Academy has been in operation at its present site since July 1995. This premier state fire-training Fire Academy features modern classrooms, a 60-room dormitory, cafeteria, drill tower, six-bay fire station, student processing center, two burn buildings, flammable liquid and gases training, propane live-fire training, and two computer-controlled Federal Aviation Agency-funded aircraft training props. Many specialized programs that require live burns are conducted at the Fire Academy site. Also, many industrial customers come to the Fire Academy for their emergency training. Last year, we conducted 168 industrial programs with 2,503 students attending. Industrial customers are both in-state and out-of-state companies. We charge a reasonable fee for this training, and the revenue helps operate the Fire Academy. Industrial revenue is about 33 percent of the Fire Academy budget. The Fire Academy also conducts haz-mat and rescue programs for the Emergency Preparedness Division, funded by Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) grants. The Fire Academy received an \$80,000 grant from FEMA and the National Fire Academy to conduct specialized terrorism and rescue programs and to purchase equipment, books and materials to support these programs.

Curriculum, Accreditation and Certification

The Fire Academy operates an instructor certification program for more than 635 part-time instructors, who teach courses at the Fire Academy, and in their local fire departments. The instructor certification system requires entry-level and recertification requirements. The certification system is a key element in the delivery of 85 percent of all Fire Academy off-campus training. The main focus of the Curriculum Section this year has been the full implementation of the Firefighter I and Firefighter II Programs. This implementation was the first major change to our firefighter basic curriculum in more than 15 years. Three new courses were designed during this process to replace the 1100 series of training that had served our state well since the mid-80s. The three new courses were designed to take a new firefighter from the basic Occupational Safety and Health Agency requirements (Course 1152) and provide them a path of progression through Firefighter I and Firefighter II (Courses 1153 and 1154). Both of these courses meet the National Fire Protection Association National Standard 1001, "Qualifications for Professional Firefighter." This implementation required purchasing an in-house production of several curriculum elements. The total cost of materials for implementation was more than \$87,000. The Fire Academy received a one-time donation from the South Carolina Firemen's Association of \$50,000 toward the total cost of this project. This played a significant part in allowing the Fire Academy to make this needed change to meet International Fire Service Accreditation Congress accreditation and certification requirement. Other major curriculum projects included the updating of several industrial programs and hazardous materials courses along with the development of the Fire and Life Safety Education I Program.

The Fire Academy operates a firefigher certificaton program that is accredited by the International Fire

Service Accreditation Congress. The Fire Academy's program includes seven separate certification areas: Firefighter I, Firefighter II, Driver/Operator, Instructor I, Fire Officer I, ARFF and Fire and Life Safety Educator I. Last year, the Fire Academy provided testing and certified 766 firefighters.

Regional Training

The Fire Academy operates six regional offices, three with full-time staff personnel, and three with part-time staff personnel. The regional offices coordinate and schedule training programs to be conducted at local fire departments or at the regional offices. Many programs are conducted locally and departments send their students to the Fire Academy for their live fire burns and for special programs that cannot be offered in the field. Last year, the Fire Academy trained about 12,573 of the total 17,144 students through its regional office network. Using a training concept known as "train-the-trainer," the Fire Academy trains the public fire department's training staff in educational methodology and specific fire courses. This system is efficient in that the Fire Academy issues certificates and maintains course records, but does not provide salary compensation or travel for instructor services. It does supervise and oversees the training for course quality and standard compliance.

DIVISION OF LABOR

State of South Carolina and federal laws are the source of various rights employers and employees have in their employer/employee relationships. LLR, Division of Labor, is one of several state and federal agencies which administers the laws. Occupational safety, payment of wages, child labor, migrant labor and mediation of disputes between unions and businesses all fall under this division. Elevators and amusement rides also are regulated through this division.

Office of Occupational Safety and Health

Compliance Section

The purpose of the state Occupational Safety and Health Act is to assure working men and women a safe and healthful working environment. To see that the objectives of the act are met, the Compliance Section staff of 16 compliance officers and nine industrial hygienists conducts inspections to ensure compliance with safety standards and initiate enforcement procedures in cases of noncompliance.

During FY 99-00, the Compliance Section conducted 1793 inspections. Safety inspections numbered 1,572 or 87.7 percent of this total. Health inspections numbered 221 or 12.3 percent of total inspections.

A further analysis of compliance activity reveals the following:

- 1,110 planned inspections
- 221 complaint inspections
- 74 accident and fatality investigations, which involved 32 fatalities
- 25 referral inspections
- 86 unprogrammed related inspections
- 62 follow-up inspections
- 178 programmed related inspections
- 37 monitoring inspections

A total of 4,405 violations were cited. The 1,532 other than serious violations accounted for 34.8 percent; 2,863 serious violations accounted for 65 percent; and 7 repeat violations accounted for .2 percent of the total violations. The adjusted penalties for these violations amounted to \$765,576.00. Penalties collected totaled \$665,409.00. During the fiscal year, three willful violations, which accounted for less than 1 percent of total violations, were given.

Technical Support Section

Integrated Management Information System

This section has the responsibility to compile, analyze and prepare accurate data concerning safety and health inspections and activities which will assist in the management of the state OSH program. Data collected is used to plan, direct and evaluate the OSH program and to provide objective information on which to base policy decisions.

Statistics Section

Annual Occupational Injuries and Illnesses Survey

The annual Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) Survey of Occupational Injuries and Illnesses by Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) and the Census of Fatal Occupational Injuries (CFOI) Program are conducted by the Statistics Section of OSH in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Only a relatively small percentage of the total private sector employers are required to report on the BLS survey. Data collected in this survey is based on uniform recordkeeping requirements, which are mandatory under provisions of both the 1970 Occupational Safety and Health Act and corresponding state laws. The data compiled in this survey is used to provide a management tool for safety engineers and persons interested in measurements of work injuries and illnesses.

During 1998, workers in South Carolina's private industry experienced job-related injuries and illnesses at a rate of 5.7 per 100 full-time employees. Of the 1,449,900 persons employed in South Carolina's private sector workforce in 1998, about one out of every 18 workers suffered a work-related injury or illness. A total of 73,200 occupational injuries and illnesses were reported in South Carolina's private industry workplaces in 1998, a 3.9 percent decrease from 1997. Of the 73,200 recordable cases, an estimated 30,300 cases involved lost workdays. About 95.6 percent of the recordable cases were occupational injuries, and 4.4 percent were illnesses.

BLS survey questionnaires were mailed to 4,142 BLS sample units. A relatively small portion of these were excluded because:

- The employer was no longer in operation;
- They were included in a report for another location;
- Duplicate survey forms were received for the same location; or
- The survey form was not mailed because of an inadequate address.

Mailings, original and follow-up, and telephone calls resulted in 3,143 usable BLS survey questionnaires.

A total of 139 fatal occupational injuries were reported in South Carolina in 1999 under the CFOI Program. Highway accidents were the leading cause of the fatal work injuries in South Carolina accounting for 48 fatal injuries, followed by 21 homicides.

Under §41-15-600 through §41-15-640, South Carolina Code of Laws, 1976 (as amended), the South Carolina Occupational Health and Safety Review Board is responsible for hearing and deciding contested cases resulting from citations and penalties and determining time periods for abatement of citations issued by the director of LLR.

The board consists of six members, one from each Congressional district.

The Voluntary Protection Program (VPP) or Palmetto Star Program continues to recognize manufacturing facilities that have exemplary safety and health records and reduced injury and illness rates.

Office of Elevators and Amusement Rides

The office was created in 1986 to administer the South Carolina Elevator Code and the South Carolina Amusement Ride Safety Code. To ensure compliance with both codes, the licensing staff of 11 inspectors conducts inspections of new and existing elevator facilities and amusement rides.

Elevator Safety Inspections

Under Chapter 16 of Title 41 of the South Carolina Code of Laws, 1976 (as amended), the Office of Elevators and Amusement Rides administers regulations governing construction, alteration, and installation of new elevators, escalators, dumbwaiters, handicapped lifts and moving walks. It also administers safety standards for existing facilities. All safety standards are national consensus standards as published by the American National Standards Institute. The office, and the private inspectors it licenses, inspects elevator facilities and issues operating certificates.

Since registration of elevators and related equipment formally began in July 1986, 7,677 elevators and related equipment have been registered in South Carolina. The highest number of registered facilities were in Richland, Charleston, Greenville and Horry counties. The Office of Elevators and Amusement Rides conducted 6,702 inspections of elevators, escalators, dumbwaiters, handicapped lifts and moving walks. Licensed private inspectors conducted an additional 1,094 inspections. There were 7,796 inspections of elevator-related equipment in FY 99-00.

Fees for the inspections performed by the Office of Elevators and Amusement Rides are based on the contract price for new elevators under construction or the number of floors served by existing elevators. Fees collected for elevator inspections and permitting are as follows:

Amusement Ride Safety Inspections

Under Chapter 18 of Title 41 of the South Carolina Code of Laws 1976 (as amended), the Office of Elevators and Amusement Rides administers regulations to guard against injuries in the assembly, disassembly and use of amusement devices at carnivals, fairs and amusement parks. The office, and any special inspector it licenses, inspects amusement devices and issues operating permits. Inspection fees are based on the type of device being inspected and are set by regulation no more than once per year.

During FY 99-00, the office issued 733 operating permits for amusement devices and collected \$69,112 in inspection fees. Fines and re-inspection fees for rides that did not comply with state laws totaled \$8,562 this year.

Bungee Jumping

The office began regulating the practice of bungee jumping in July 1994. In FY 99-00, the only site in the state was Myrtle Beach. The office collected \$450 in inspection fees.

Office of Labor Services

Wages

The Office of Labor Services is responsible for enforcing the South Carolina labor laws regarding payment of wages and child labor. The Payment of Wages Law requires employers to give written notice to employees of certain key provisions of their wages, to pay according to this notice and to keep records of the payments. LLR is authorized to make inspections, issue warnings and citations and assess civil penalties for violations of the act.

The state's child labor laws allow the agency to make findings concerning employers who engage in any oppressive child labor actions, to issue warnings and to assess civil penalties.

During FY 99-00, 1,873 business were investigated; 1004 warnings were issued for violations of the recordkeeping requirement of 41-10-30; and 773 citations were issued for violations of 41-10-40, payment of wages accounting for \$142,830 in assessed penalties and \$78,888.00 in collected penalties.

Office of Labor-Management Mediation

Under §41-17-10 of the South Carolina, 1976 (as amended), the LLR director is responsible for assisting in the settlement of labor disputes (except railroads and express companies doing business by rail). Through the Office of Labor-Management Mediation, the director investigates industrial disputes, strikes, lockouts, and their causes, and tries to help the two sides reach an agreement. When requested by both sides, mediators will act as arbitrators or appoint other arbitrators. In general, the Office of Labor-Management Mediation tries to eliminate the causes of misunderstanding and differences between organized labor and management.

This office also administers the South Carolina Right to Work Law (S.C. Code of Laws, §41-7-10 through §41-7-90), which provides that the rights of workers shall not be denied or abridged based upon their affiliation or non-affiliation with a labor union. During FY 99-00, 35 Right to Work complaints were received.

During FY 99-00, the Office of Labor-Management Mediation monitored and/or participated in 176 contract negotiations involving 10,519 union employees. One strike was reported that involved 25 union workers and a total of 1,200 lost work hours.

Migrant and Seasonal Farm Workers Commission

The South Carolina Migrant and Seasonal Farm Workers Commission is charged with the responsibility of "examination and supervision of the migrant labor programs in South Carolina, the cooperation with state and federal agencies in improving existing programs, and the coordination of programs to improve the conditions for migrant labor."

The office operates as a clearinghouse by assisting, coordinating and monitoring programs and services provided by public and private organizations.

The office works closely with all agencies addressing the laws pertaining to farmers and migrant and seasonal farm workers in South Carolina.

During FY 99-00, the office accomplished the following goals:

- 1. Participated in addressing problems and issues that affected migrant and seasonal farm workers. These cases involved housing, hiring practices, emergency assistance, terminations, immigration and referrals.
- 2. Continued to operate a toll-free telephone line with voice mail features in English and Spanish so that farm workers and individuals would have access to the office when it is closed or the staff is out of the office.
- 3. Distributed the South Carolina OSHA poster and the *Services for Migrant Workers* handbook in English and Spanish, which includes emergency numbers to help farm workers and growers obtain services when needed.
- 4. Distributed the video package containing two videos, "Steps to Compliance—An Educational Tool for Growers in South Carolina" and "Avoiding Immigration Discrimination in Agriculture" to grower's associations, agencies and individuals.
- 5. Collected and distributed clothing, toys, books and toiletries for migrant workers.
- 6. Worked with a non-profit company to obtain a grant for migrant housing.
- 7. Spoke to church and civic groups about migrant workers in South Carolina.

South Carolina Migrant and Seasonal Farm Workers Commission

Under South Carolina Code of Laws 46-43-20, 1976 (as amended), the South Carolina Migrant and Seasonal Farm Workers Commission is responsible for "maintaining a continuing consultative examination and supervision of the migrant labor program relating to living conditions; health, housing and public assistance and the coordination of federal, state and local programs relating thereto."

DIVISION OF PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL LICENSING

Occupational licensure has a long history. Modern day licensure has its roots in workers' guilds, which can be traced back to the 10th century in England. The first modern effort to regulate occupations and professions was Virginia's medical practice act in 1639. In the late 1800s, state licensure activity began in earnest, and by 1900, a majority of the states had licensed attorneys, dentists, pharmacists, physicians and teachers. Between 1900 and 1960, most states licensed an additional 20 occupations and professions including accountants, nurses, real estate brokers, barbers, hairdressers, chiropractors and funeral directors. Today, more than 80 occupations and professions are licensed by one or more states.

Occupational licensing is an exercise of the state's inherent police power to protect the health, safety and welfare of its citizens. State licensure is deemed appropriate when:

- unqualified practice poses a serious risk to a consumer's life, health, safety or economic well-being;
- the public cannot accurately judge a practitioner's qualifications; and
- benefits to the public clearly outweigh potential harmful effects of licensure (such as a decrease in the supply of practitioners).

The absence of these conditions generally indicates that licensure is not justified or that some alternative form of regulation such as registration or certification may be appropriate. Proponents of licensure argue that the purpose of licensure is to raise standards of practice, ensure quality service and establish accepted codes of ethical behavior. In the past two decades, awareness of licensure's concomitant responsibility to promote continuing professional education and competence and to enforce licensure laws against fraudulent, incompetent and unethical behavior, has grown.

On Feb. 1, 1994, Act 181 created the South Carolina Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation (DLLR). This act restructured a significant portion of state government by merging the Department of Labor, the State Fire Marshal's Office, the South Carolina Fire Academy and 38 professional and occupational licensing boards to form a new agency. The Professional and Occupational Licensing (POL) Division was established to oversee the administration of the licensing boards. The boards are categorized and separated into three related offices:

Business and Related Services Office of Health and Medically Related Professions Office of Property, Environmental, Design and Construction Services

The administration office for the POL division is the focal point and liaison office for all POL office groupings. Administration staff deals with issues which include:

- participation in agency strategic planning
- · analysis of program effectiveness and cost efficiency
- assessment of information technology direction
- professional legal direction to boards during administrative hearings
- response to inquiries regarding licensing matters or other concerns and resolution of complaints
- oversight of procurement, personnel and other agency administrative matters
- investigation of diverse problems or situations which arise within the division
- coordination of the DSS Child Support Enforcement Division license revocation process

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE LIAISON

The Legislative Liaison Office (LLO), which falls under the Office of the Director, handles all legislation, internally and externally, that affects the South Carolina Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation (LLR), including the professional and occupational licensing boards/commissions, the Department of Labor, the South Carolina Fire Academy and the Office of State Fire Marshal. The LLO facilitates the submission of legislation to the General Assembly as well as tracks and monitors all legislation that affects the agency. Since LLR is a cabinet agency, the LLO works closely with the Governor's Office in the initial filing stages and throughout the Legislative Session to have input on all legislation affecting the divisions of the agency.

The agency established a templating process for rewriting the licensing acts for LLR boards and commissions in 1996, Act 453, which was approved and passed by the General Assembly. Since that time, the agency has assisted several boards and commissions in rewriting their statutes. While the agency's input is limited to the structured format and content as it relates to administrative issues, it does not infringe upon the boards' autonomy and responsibility to regulate their respective professions.

During the 2000 Legislative Session, LLR filed and passed 13 regulations, most of which were changes to the boards' existing regulations to make them better comply with their current practice acts. Five practice acts passed this session, and seven more are anticipated to pass in 2001. The other bills filed by LLR that passed in 2000 were statutory changes to current practice acts and labor laws, not total rewrites.
