Board Welcomes 2 New Members

Gov. Jim Hodges has appointed two new members to the Board of Architectural Examiners, José R. Caban and Dennis S. Ward.

Caban was appointed by Hodges in October 2000 to serve a five-year term as the educator/architect member of the Board. Caban is chair of the School of Architecture at Clemson University, a position he has held six years. He is also a professor of architecture and, prior to his current position, served as head of the Planning and Landscape Architecture Department at Clemson.

Caban earned a bachelor of architecture degree from Clemson University in 1967 and a master of civic design degree from University of Liverpool, England, in 1971. He was instrumental in starting a graduate dual degree program at Clemson in architecture and planning, and he initiated a public service assistantship program benefiting many local agencies in the Upstate as well as Clemson students. In 2000, Caban started a new program in Barcelona, Spain, where Clemson architecture undergraduates spend one semester of study.

Caban speaks Spanish fluently and modestly acknowledges a "working knowl-

edge" of French and Italian. These skills have served him well in his work and travels worldwide. He was a Distinguished Visitor on the Faculty of Architecture, University of Rosario, Argentina, and a visiting lecturer at the Center for Environmental Studies and



Projects, La Plata, Argentina. He has been invited to speak at the annual convention of the Architects Association of Puerto Rico and at a symposium in Salamanca, Spain. His architectural skills are apparent in many Puerto Rican areas and he practices in and around Clemson, when time allows.

Recently, Caban traveled to Dubai, United Arab Emirates, as a member of an international architectural accreditation team.

We welcome José to the Board and value his unique perspective as an educator as well as the continuing link he represents between architectural education and practice.

Ward was appointed by Hodges to serve a five-year term as an architect member of the Board, effective May 12. Ward is President of F W Architects, Inc., in Florence, a position he has held six years.

Ward earned a bachelor of science degree in design (1979) and a master of architecture degree (1981) from Clemson University. During his graduate work, he studied at Clemson's Daniels Center for Urban Studies in Genoa, Italy. Ward also has studied Business Law at the University of Colorado.

While his architecture practice consumes most of his time, Ward has found time to serve as a state AIA Section president, board member of the Brick Association of the Carolinas, and as a member of the Construction Specifications Institute. He is a member of the Lions Club and serves on a local speech and hearing board.

We welcome Dennis and anticipate his contribution to the Board as a seasoned architect.

Board Conducts Building Official Workshop

The Board conducted its third annual all-day workshop March 1 for building officials, plan reviewers and code enforcement officers. Eighty-three people from across the state participated in the workshop sponsored by LLR's Board of Architectural Examiners, Board of Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors, Building Codes Council, Contractors Licensing Board, Residential Builders Commission, and State Fire Marshal.

The workshop included topics such as legal responsibilities of code officials, Building Codes Council complaint and investigative process, residential specialty contractors requirements, contractors licensing laws,

modular construction updates, architectural and engineering requirements, fire marshal responsibilities, and DHEC facilities planning requirements and updates. Speakers included Robert Selman, LLR assistant deputy director; Robert S. Shelley, investigator for the Board of Architecture; Charles Ido, investigator for the Board of Engineers and Land Surveyors; Kent Lesesne, LLR attorney; Gary Wiggins, administrator for the Building Codes Council; Vaughn Wicker, SBCCI; Charles McAlister, manager of Regulatory Compliance for the Residential Builders Commission; Ron Galloway, administrator for the Contractors Licensing

Board; Doug Green, coordinator for the Modular Building Program; David Bennett, program coordinator for the Manufactured Housing Board; State Fire Marshal Robert Polk; and Bill Lafferty, director, DHEC Health Facilities Construction.

Question and answer sessions followed presentations, and speakers were available to answer questions and share information. Judging from the enthusiastic participation and positive feedback from participants, the workshop provided useful information needed daily by state building officials and plans examiners.

Individual Licenses Expire June 30

Individual Certificates of Registration expire on JUNE 30, 2001. Renewal notices will be mailed on or about May 18, 2001. If you do not receive a renewal notice by June 1, contact our office. We no longer send reminder notices of renewals.

To avoid a late fee and to keep your name out of the Enforcement Report of this newsletter, read carefully and answer truthfully the questions asked on the renewal form, sign it, and return by July 1. *You are the only person responsible for your answers to these questions*. If false or misleading information is provided, the Board will hold you responsible—not your secretary, assistant or office manager.

Update on Continuing Education

Regulations proposed by the Board for mandatory continuing education are making their way through the state Legislature and are expected to be approved in June 2001. To renew an individual architect license in South Carolina, 12 hours of continuing education must be obtained annually. If the regulations are approved, the first reporting period will be with the renewal of licenses in June 2003. More information will be distributed upon approval by the Legislature

Highlights of the proposed regulations:

- All 12 hours of continuing education must be in structured course study (reading magazine articles will not count).
- Eight hours must be in topics related to health, safety and welfare; four hours may be in practice-related topics.
- Twelve hours of carry-over will be allowed for a maximum of one year.
- Exemptions will be given for first-time registrants, civilians serving on active duty in the military for 90 consecutive days or more, non-resident architects who must obtain comparable CE in another jurisdiction, and hardship cases.
- The first report of CE obtained will be on renewal forms due by June 30, 2003.
- Noncompliance is considered a violation of the Architect Registration Law.

The entire text of the proposed regulations is printed below.

Regulation 11-1. Definitions.

- (5) Continuing Education Hour" means one (1) contact hour of participation in a continuing education activity.
- (6) Contact hour" means a minimum of fifty (50) minutes of instruction.

Regulation 11-8. Renewals.

A. Certificates of Registration issued to individuals expire annually on June 30. They must be renewed annually for the following fiscal year by payment of the renewal fee and by reporting completion of the required continuing education hours on or before July l. Certificates shall become invalid after that date unless renewed.

- B. Certificates of Authorization issued to firms expire annually on December 31. They must be renewed annually for the following calendar year by payment of the renewal fee on or before January 1 and shall become invalid after that date unless renewed.
- C. Lapsed Certificates may be reinstated by the Board at any time during the remainder of the following year on demonstration of qualification and payment of the annual renewal fee plus late penalties. In case of failure to reinstate within a year from the date of expiration, the Certificate cannot be reissued except by a new application accompanied by the application fee and approval by the Board.

Regulation 11-8.1. Continuing Education. A. These requirements shall apply to every South Carolina registered architect as a condition for renewal of registration on an annual basis.

B. Exemptions: A registrant may be exempt from the continuing education requirements for one of the following reasons:

- (1) A first-time new registrant by examination or reciprocity will be exempt for the first renewal.
- (2) Registrant is a civilian who serves on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States for a period of time exceeding ninety consecutive days during the annual report period.
- (3) Registrants are non-residents of South Carolina and are required to obtain continuing education hours for license renewal by the licensing authority of any state in which he or she is registered. If the Board determines the continuing education requirements are substantially equivalent to those of South Carolina, the Board may accept a statement of compliance from the registrant.
- (4) Hardship cases may be considered on an individual basis.
- C. Requirements.
 - (1) Each South Carolina registered architect shall complete a minimum of twelve continuing education hours of structured course study each fiscal year.
 - (2) Structured course study shall consist of participation in education activities

- presented by individuals or groups qualified by professional, practical, or academic experience to conduct courses of study.
- (3) Topics for the twelve continuing education hours shall meet the following requirements:
- (a) A minimum of eight continuing education hours shall include the study of relevant technical and professional architectural subjects related to safeguarding life, health, property, and promoting the public welfare.
- (b) A maximum of four continuing education hours may consist of elective topics related to any other area in the practice of architecture.
- (4) Each registrant shall submit, on a form provided by the Board, a signed affidavit attesting to the fulfillment of continuing education requirements during the preceding period of one fiscal year ending June 30. The first report will be due before June 30, 2003. Reports will be due with each renewal thereafter. Carry-over of a maximum of twelve continuing education hours for one year is permitted.
- (5) Each affidavit may be subject to audit for verification of compliance with requirements. Registrants shall retain proof of fulfillment of requirements for a period of one year after submission in the event the affidavit is selected for audit.
- (6) The Board may disallow claimed credit for continuing education hours. The registrant shall have one hundred eighty calendar days after notification of disallowance of credit to substantiate the original claim or earn other continuing education credit which fulfills minimum requirements.
- D. Noncompliance and Sanctions.
 Failure to fulfill the continuing education requirements or to file the required annual report, properly completed and signed, shall be considered a violation of the Architectural Registration Law.

Disciplinary Actions

- Gus J. Roberts, Registered Architect, Columbia, entered into a Consent Order with the Board in connection with his involvement in a church project in Clarendon County. In the Order, Roberts admitted that the design drawings he provided for the project, which included architectural, structural, mechanical and electrical drawings, were incomplete, not properly coordinated, and did not provide the minimum amount of information required to protect the life, safety and welfare of the public. Roberts also admitted that the structural, mechanical and electrical design he provided for the project falls outside the scope of the practice of architecture, as defined by statute. Sanctions imposed were a Public Reprimand, \$3,500 fine, and agreement to cease and desist from providing services outside the scope of the practice of architecture on any and all South Carolina projects.
- · Angela L. Miller, Registered Architect, Hilton Head Island, entered into a Consent Order with the Board in connection with her involvement in the design of a single-family residence to be constructed in Rose Hill Plantation, Bluffton. In the Order, Miller admitted that her involvement in the project was limited to reviewing work already prepared by unlicensed draftsman James Reardon, Savannah, GA. Miller asserted that her actions in this matter were inadvertent rather than contemplated misconduct. However, she also failed to produce documentation to indicate that she demonstrated the appropriate degree of direct professional knowledge, supervision and control required for the

- professionally sealed work for the project. Sanctions imposed were a Public Reprimand, \$1,000 fine, and agreement to immediately and forever cease and desist from further unlawful activity on any South Carolina project.
- Mark D. Verret, Registered Architect, Houston, TX, entered into a Consent Order with the Board based upon his involvement in a telephone call center to be constructed in Williamsburg County. At the time the professional services for the project were rendered, neither Verret nor his firm, Verret Architects, were registered to practice in South Carolina. Sanctions imposed were a Public Reprimand and \$500 fine. Both Verret and his firm are now registered to practice in South Carolina.
- Charles L. Joe, unlicensed individual, Sumter, and his company, Joe-Montgomery Builders, were issued a Cease and Desist Order for conveying the impression that they practice architecture in South Carolina.
- James Reardon, unlicensed draftsman, Savannah, GA, and his company, RE Architecture, Planning, and Construction, were issued a Cease and Desist Order for identifying themselves as a provider of architectural services on design documents for a single-family residence to be constructed in Bluffton.
- Leroy Outing, contractor, Columbia, was issued a Cease and Desist Order for originating portions of a design package for an addition to a church in Newberry County.

- George Mercurius, unlicensed individual, Atlanta, GA, and his firm, Mercurius Design, Inc., were issued a Cease and Desist Order for identifying themselves as providers of architectural services on design drawings for an assembly occupancy to be constructed in Orangeburg County.
- Eugene S. Adams, Professional Engineer, Mooresville, NC, was issued a
 Cease and Desist Order in connection
 with his involvement in the design of
 several Dollar General Store projects
 constructed in South Carolina.
- William S. Warner, unlicensed individual, Hilton Head Island, was issued a Cease and Desist Order in connection with his involvement in the design of a single-family residence to be constructed in Haig Point Plantation, Hilton Head Island.
- A South Carolina registered architectural firm entered into a Private Agreement with the Board for inappropriate remarks made during a presentation to a school district selection committee.
- Sixteen Letters of Caution were issued to South Carolina registrants for various matters including: unregistered firm issues, unethical practice, improper sealing of design documents offered for permit, required involvement of appropriate licensed design professionals, etc.
- Two Letters of Caution were issued to non-registrant individuals/entities for inappropriate use of the title "architect" and unauthorized offering of architectural services.

Be Aware of Building Codes Changes

The following article by Gary Wiggins, administrator of the Building Codes Council, offers information about building codes implementation to all architects practicing in South Carolina:

On May 24, 2000, the Building Codes Council updated the mandatory and permissive building codes for use within South Carolina. The documents adopted for mandatory use include the 2000 edition of the International Building, Residential, Plumbing, Mechanical, Fuel Gas, Energy Conservation and Fire Codes. The document adopted as the permissive (by option of the local jurisdiction) code is the 2000 Edition of the International Property Maintenance Code.

The Council established the implementation date for local jurisdictions as July 1, 2001 for all codes, with the exception of the

International Residential Code. The implementation date established for the International Residential Code is July 1, 2002. All local jurisdictions must adopt and begin enforcement of the mandatory codes by their respective implementation dates and may adopt and enforce the permissive code at any time after the mandatory codes.

From the Investigator's Desk

In order to provide clear information about how complaints are handled, the Board recently developed a brochure, "Information about complaints and the investigative process in South Carolina." It is intended for distribution to respondents, complainants or anyone upon request. The text of the brochure follows:

The South Carolina State Board of Architectural Examiner's mission is to safeguard the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of South Carolina. In carrying out this responsibility, the Board sets educational and experience requirements, establishes minimum standards of conduct, and engages in disciplinary action when necessary. This brochure explains the various steps involved in the complaint resolution process.

Complaints

Complaints and referrals are received from a variety of sources: architects, citizens, building officials and other state agencies. Complaints may allege unethical conduct, incompetence, unregistered practice or other actions. All complaints, regardless of the source or type of allegation, are investigated.

Investigation

The Board investigator's role is to obtain, verify and/or uncover facts relating to a complaint. The investigator may obtain design documents, building permits, photographs, relevant printed or electronic material, or any other physical evidence related to the complaint. The investigator may request that you and others provide written responses. The investigator also may speak to you and others by telephone and/or ask to meet with you or others in person. You may request to meet with the investigator. All of these efforts are for the purpose of gathering information.

Review Procedures

Once the investigator has collected all

information and evidence pertinent to the complaint, a written report summarizing the facts is prepared. The report and all evidence is reviewed by the Board's Investigative Review Committee (IRC), which is comprised of the investigator, Board administrator, Board attorney and two South Carolina registered architects. The IRC's purpose is to determine whether or not probable cause exists that a violation of the South Carolina Architectural Registration Law has occurred. If the IRC believes probable cause exists, it may recommend formal disciplinary proceedings or other settlement to be considered by the Board. If the IRC does not believe probable cause exists, it recommends that the Board dismiss the case as unfounded. The IRC does not meet with complainants, respondents or witnesses involved in the case; its responsibility is to review all evidence from the investigation and submit a recommendation for resolution to the Board. The Board reviews IRC recommendations, along with a summary in each case, where all names and identifying information have been removed. For example, a summary report might state, in part, "Signed contracts show that Mr. A, a draftsman, was hired to design a 40,000 square foot commercial structure. Design documents obtained from X County Building Department show the seal, signature, and title block of Architect B who is licensed by this Board." During the nonpublic portion of a regularly scheduled meeting, Board members review the summary and the IRC's recommendation, and determine whether or not formal disciplinary proceedings are appropriate.

Board Authority

The Board has the authority to discipline a licensee by suspending or revoking the license or by restricting it in an appropriate manner. The Board may fine someone who violates the law, may issue Cease and Desist

Orders, and may issue non-disciplinary letters of caution.

Disposition

If the Board determines that formal disciplinary action is appropriate, in most cases it will authorize the investigator to attempt to negotiate a settlement agreement, called a Consent Order, which is acceptable to both the Board and the licensee. A Consent Order is a legal document that includes findings of fact, conclusions of law and sanctions acceptable to the Board. If the licensee agrees to the terms, he or she signs the Order, complies with its terms, and the case is closed. However, if the licensee contests the facts or disagrees with the findings, he or she may request a full evidentiary hearing.

Hearings are conducted according to provisions of the South Carolina Administrative Procedures Act. The Board's attorney presents the case for the state, and the licensee may be represented by counsel. Board members hear the case, all testimony is recorded by a court reporter, evidence is admitted and both sides may call witnesses. When all evidence and testimony have been presented, the Board deliberates and reaches a decision. The Board then publishes its findings and a final, written Order is prepared for distribution. Appeals of the Board's Orders may be initiated through the South Carolina Administrative Law Judge Division.

Building Codes Changes Continued

The International Code Series was developed as a joint project by the Southern Building Code Congress International, the International Conference of Building Officials and the Building Officials and Code Administrators International. It will replace the Standard,

National and Uniform Building Code Series. The 1997 Editions of the Standard, National and Uniform Codes (which were regional), and the 1995 Edition of the CABO One and Two Family Dwelling Code (which was national) were the last to be published. The International Building Code Series will

replace those documents as a single set of National Codes. All codes training and Code Enforcement Officer certification examinations will be based in the International Code series.

Professionals Must Pay Use Tax

 $The following \ article \ is from \ the \ S.C. \ Department \ of \ Revenue:$

An architect orders a printer, a plotter, computer equipment or office supplies from an out-of-state vendor and pays no sales tax

A dentist orders equipment (a panoramic x-ray machine and a cuspidor) from an out-of-state vendor.

A doctor orders specialized equipment for her office from Pennsylvania.

A lawyer goes online and finds a computer that better serves her research needs. She orders the computer, and it's shipped to her from out-of-state.

In each of these cases the person is liable for paying use tax.

What is Use Tax?

The use tax is not a new tax. It was first adopted in 1954. Forty-five states charge a use tax. States that impose a sales tax on purchases also tax the "use" of property that is brought into the state untaxed and is otherwise taxable.

Any business professional who purchases goods from an out-of-state vendor, who is not registered to collect and remit South Carolina tax, should themselves be registered to pay Use Tax.

Isn't This Just for People Who Sell Merchandise?

No. Most business taxpayers will have records of their outof-state purchases. We find in audits, however, that many non-retail businesses (e.g. construction) and service professionals (e.g. physicians and attorneys) have not paid Use Tax on items such as office supplies, bought via catalog, Internet, and mail order. This results in assessment of penalties and interest and often in claims from the taxpayers that their preparer did not inform them of this tax obligation.

How Much Do I Pay?

The Use Tax is the same rate as the sales tax - 5 percent. However, if you live in a county where there is a local option sales tax you would pay 6 or 7 percent depending on the county.

How Does the State Use the Money That's Collected?

South Carolina's use tax supports public education in this state.

LLR Implements Strategic Plan

When the South Carolina legislature created the Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation (LLR) in 1994, one driving goal was to improve efficiency and the quality of service delivered by the 40 separate agencies that were merged to form the agency.

The legislature envisioned an agency that would promote efficiency and build accountability. With that in mind, LLR's staff has created a strategic plan for the agency. This plan is a roadmap to help the agency reach the ultimate goal of being the best state government agency in the United States by the year 2010.

Key points of the strategic plan include:

- Core purpose or mission Making South Carolina a Safer and Better Place to Work and Live.
- Core values Provide excellent service, act with integrity and treat people with respect.
- Key strategies "Maximize Customer Satisfaction," "Maximize Employee Satisfaction" and "Use Resources Efficiently."

- By 2001, be recognized in the Southeastern United States as a leading state government agency.
- By 2002, be recognized in the United States as a leading state government agency.
- By 2005, have specific performance measures in place to track progress toward being the best state government agency in the United States.

"These interim goals will keep us focused on the larger goal of being the best state government agency in the United States by 2010," LLR Director Rita M. McKinney said. "I like to think of these goals as short-term wins on the road to achieving excellence in public service."

Notice to South Carolina Examination Candidates

Many of you are aware of the "rolling window" which affects credit retention of the A.R.E. divisions you have passed. You have four years from the date the rolling window provision was implemented to pass all divisions of the examination. Credit for each division passed is retained for four years after which time you must take the section(s) again.

You have unlimited opportunities to retake the examination. Even if you do not sit for an exam, the "clock" is still ticking. If you have any questions about your examination status, submit a <u>written</u> request for clarification as to how you will be affected.
