From the Administrator's Desk

There are two articles in this newsletter regarding the Board's interpretation of statutes and regulations. "Free Services Not Allowed" on page 3 addresses the issue of offering or providing free services to clients. For architects and architectural firms, the accompanying Public Order adopted by the Board on May 7, 2003, and reprinted here, is of utmost importance in clarifying architecture laws and regulations that address free services. **PLEASE READ THE ORDER CAREFULLY.** We also ask that you make a concerted effort to ensure that other architects and marketing personnel in your office understand this Order.

The other article addresses problems most often confronted by building officials. "When is an Architect Needed?" is an attempt to clarify the exemptions section of the law that lists buildings for which architects are *not* required. Please note that the law does not address the cost of the building as a criterion for exemption; square footage, height and usage of buildings are the criteria.

The Board appreciates the dedication of building officials and plans examiners who work with architects to ensure the safety of the public; their conscientious efforts often go unrecognized, and they are subjected to intense pressure from many fronts. We applaud their desire to do the right thing.

Sealing Plans Not Ready for Permitting

It occasionally comes to our attention that a permitting authority (and sometimes a reviewing authority) requires architects to seal plans being submitted for preliminary review. If you are required to seal plans that are not ready for permitting, we suggest that you print in large, bold type, "PRELIMINARY PLANS, FOR REVIEW ONLY" OR "NOT SUBMITTED FOR PERMIT," or similar language, directly on the plans. You may attach a cover letter as well, but should it become detached from the plans, you are protected if the design documents also state they are conditional. We urge permitting authorities NOT to require seals on plans submitted for review, but we have no authority to require that they comply.

When sealed and signed plans are submitted to this Board for investigation, we take the position that they are complete, they meet Code, and they are ready for permitting. This presumption is based on Section 40-3-280(B) that requires two sets of plans to be sealed in South Carolina: the set submitted to the permitting authority and the record set for the job site. If the plans are signed and sealed but investigation reveals they are incomplete, uncoordinated, or not in compliance with codes, you are at risk of receiving a sanction from this Board.

Updated NCARB Service

You can now check the status of your IDP submittals and application by going online at NCARB's Web site. This service should greatly assist you in keeping track of your paperwork and its processing timeline.

Emeritus Architects

For architects who no longer actively practice but who wish to retain their license, the South Carolina Legislature approved an Emeritus license in September 2002, effective for the renewal in June 2003. Architects choosing this category are not required to complete continuing education, and they pay a reduced renewal fee. However, to qualify, they must be 65 years old or older, must have been licensed as an architect 10 years or longer (in any U.S. jurisdiction), and must be retired from active practice. "Retired from active practice" means the architect cannot provide *any* architectural services, cannot act as an expert witness, cannot provide consulting services, and cannot advise clients. (Emeritus architects can change to active status should the need arise.)

We are pleased to announce that, at the end of August 2003, 62 architects from all over the United States are licensed as Emeritus architects. We had no way to predict the number who would take advantage of this license category, but we are pleased to have this many! If you would like information on Emeritus architects, please contact us.

Disciplinary Actions

Earl F. McKinney, an unregistered individual, Lexington, KY, signed a Consent Order with the Board in which he agreed that he practiced architecture without being licensed by the state of South Carolina in violation of a prior Cease and Desist Order. McKinney, a professional engineer, signed and sealed all pages, including architectural pages, of design documents for a retail clothing store in Forest Acres. McKinney was given a public reprimand, fined \$3,500, and given an order to cease and desist from the practice of architecture in South Carolina.

Private Reprimands were issued to two South Carolina firms and three South Carolina architects for offering free services to a prospective client where there was the future opportunity for additional work.

Interns' Corner

Interns, this is a reminder that NCARB is now assessing ARE candidates a \$35 rescheduling fee.

This fee will be assessed *each time* you make any changes to your previously scheduled ARE appointment. You will be required to select your future appointment date at the time you notify the Prometric Candidate Services Call Center of your schedule change. The only acceptable form of payment for this fee will be by credit card.

Rescheduling an existing appointment must take place no later than 12 noon ET (Eastern Time) on the third business day prior to your scheduled appointment.

(Saturday is considered a business day for Prometric.) If you fail to arrive for your scheduled appointment or attempt to reschedule without giving the required notice, you will forfeit the entire test fee.

Notice To South Carolina Examination Candidates

Many of you are aware of the "rolling window" which affects credit retention of the A.R.E. divisions you have passed. You have four years from the date the rolling window provision was implemented to pass all divisions of the examination. Credit for each division passed is retained for four years after which time you must take the section(s) again.

You have unlimited opportunities to retake the examination. Even if you do not sit for an exam, the "clock" is still ticking. If you have any questions about your examination status, please submit a written request for clarification as to how you will be affected.

Free Services Not Allowed

The Board has recently considered cases in which architectural firms and individuals have offered free services where the opportunity for future work existed. Due to perceived confusion regarding the issue of offering and/or providing free architectural services, the Board takes this opportunity to make clear its interpretation of Regulations 11-12(A)(1), 11-12(C)(2), 11-12(C)(3), and 11-12(D)(2) to the architectural community by issuing a Public Order. **This Order affects all licensed individuals and firms practicing architecture in South Carolina.**

The Order was approved by the Board on May 7, 2003.

Public Order

1. The S.C. Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation, Office of the State Board of Architectural Examiners ("Board") has charged several architects and two separate firms with violation of 23 S.C. Code Ann. Reg. 11-12(E)(2) (Supp. 2001) for improperly interpreting Regulations 11-12(A)(1), (C)(2), (C)(3), and (D)(2) governing conditions of architectural compensation in this state. Regulation 11-12(A)(1) became effective May 28, 1999. The purpose of this Order is to clarify the Board's interpretations of the Regulations for the architectural community.

2. Regulation 11-12(A)(1) provides: "When conditions of compensation are submitted in a proposal for a study, pre-design or preliminary design service, where future opportunity for additional work on the project is also available to the offerer, such conditions must be representative of the real cost of services to be performed." Regulation 11-12(C)(2) provides: "An architect or firm shall neither offer nor make any gift to a government official (whether elected or appointed) with the intent of influencing the official's judgment in connection with a prospective or existing project." Regulation 11-12(C)(3) provides: "An architect or firm shall comply with the registration laws, rules, and regulations governing the practice of architecture in this State and in any other jurisdiction." Finally, Regulation 11-12(D)(2) provides: "An architect or firm shall neither offer nor make any gifts, other than gifts of nominal value . . . with the intent of influencing the judgment of an existing or prospective client." The acts complained of took place within six weeks of the effective date of Regulation 11-12(A) (1).

3. During separate presentations by the architects and the firms in question regarding a project for a governmental body, one firm offered a facility study for free, while the other firm offered to perform the same study at a flat blended minimum compensation rate and, if the firm were chosen to perform the additional work on the project, to credit the governmental body for the cost of the study which resulted in the additional project work.

4. After investigation into the respective matters and numerous discussions with the parties, as well as architects throughout the state, it is apparent that there is confusion regarding the interpretation of these regulations within the architectural community, especially with regard to Regulation 11-12(A)(1). It appears that there is a wide range of interpretation of this regulation within the architectural community as well as application in the architectural



profession. This is shown by the apparent intention of the architects in these cases not to violate the Regulation. Prior to the filing of formal charges, one of the two firms involved in this matter sought clarification regarding Regulation 11-12(A)(1). The Board takes this opportunity to clarify all the Regulations at issue and to give the architectural community clear direction in these matters.

5. Under Regulations 11-12(A)(1), 11-12(C)(2), and 11-12(C)(3), neither a firm nor an architect can provide **free** services to a client, unless otherwise expressly excepted by the statutes or regulations governing the practice of architecture or other state law. The prohibition of free services includes any mechanism resulting in no cost to the client including crediting back the cost of the services against any future services or similar accounting practices.

6. For purposes of Regulation 11-12(A)(1), "real cost of services" means the fair market value of the architectural services based upon the architect's or firm's prevailing fee schedule.

7. For the purposes of Regulation 11-12(C)(2), an offer to perform work at less than fair market value on a project is not considered to be a gift to a government official since the intent of the Regulation was directed at the governmental bodies.

8. For the purposes of Regulation 11(D)(2), the Board will presume that an architect or firm who performs work or offers to perform work at less than fair market value as defined in paragraph 6 has made a gift to a client with the intent to influence the judgment of the existing or prospective client.

9. In light of this clarification and the uncertainty surrounding the interpretation of the Regulations, the respective respondents and all architects licensed to provide architectural services in South Carolina are cautioned in the future to inquire with the Board for a written interpretation of any regulation that they do not fully understand.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that the Board staff disseminate this Order in a manner calculated to reach as many architects licensed in this state as is feasible.

Funding Suggestions Needed

When the Legislature approved the creation of the Education and Research Fund in September 2002, the Board was given authority to set aside up to \$10 annually from each renewal fee. The fund is to be used for activities that benefit individuals and firms licensed in South Carolina; for architectural interns; and for analysis and evaluation of factors that affect the architecture profession in South Carolina. The Board elected to set aside \$10 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2003, and we now ask for suggestions for expenditure of these funds.

One of the Board's ongoing initiatives is to fund the IDP enrollment fee for all fourth-year students in the architecture program at Clemson University and the entire fee for all students enrolled in the Masters in Architecture program who elect to take advantage of the offer. The Board's assistance to Clemson students is offered as support of the belief that interns' experience should be recorded as it is accomplished, that accurate accounting is important, and that supervisors should be systematic and consistent in verifying interns' work. Annually, funding for IDP enrollment and fees is approximately \$5,000.

The Architecture Education and Research Fund underwrote a large portion of the costs for the *Ethics in Architecture* workshop held in April. This workshop was well received, and the Board is considering expanding it to include more architects, while still retaining the small-group format.

South Carolina Architect Receives National Award



National Council of Architectural Registration Boards President C. Robert Campbell, FAIA, (2002-2003) awarded the President's Medal for Distinguished Service to Stephen A. Usry,

AIA, of Myrtle Beach, in recognition of his significant contribution to the protection of the public health, safety and welfare through his service to NCARB and to the practice of architecture.

Usry was honored during NCARB's Annual Meeting and Conference, held in

June in San Antonio, Texas. The President's Medal awards program was established in 1994 to recognize those individuals who dedicate part of their careers, energy and wisdom to benefit the work of NCARB, the public and the architectural profession.

Usry is president of Usry Wolfe Koll Architecture, Inc., a firm based in Myrtle Beach that specializes in publicly funded commissions for educational and community projects. From 1990 to 2003, he served on the South Carolina Board of Architectural Examiners, where he was elected chair for five years. Usry also has contributed his leadership to NCARB's Southern Conference, serving as both treasurer and chair.

Usry's unstinting dedication to the architectural profession's most vital constituency, the student/intern population, is without peer. He has served as both chair

and member of NCARB's Committee on the Intern Development Program (IDP) and as South Carolina's IDP State Coordinator. Usry also served as NCARB's liaison to the IDP Coordinating Committee, an entity comprising representatives from the American Institute of Architects, the American Institute of Architecture Students, the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture, and NCARB.

He is affiliated with the American Institute of Architects and the Southern Building Code Congress International. He is licensed to practice in North Carolina and South Carolina, and holds the NCARB Certificate for national reciprocity. Usry completed a bachelor of arts and a master of architecture from Clemson University, where he is currently a member of the President's Advisory Board.

Clemson University Awarded NCARB Prize For Innovative Programs



The National Council of Architectural Registration Boards recently recognized six accomplished architectural programs. Clemson University's

Architecture Center at Charleston was one of the six programs chosen to receive the prize of \$7,500. Now in its second year, the NCARB Prize for the Creative Integration of Practice and Education in the Academy continues to draw submissions from dozens of NAAB-accredited programs.

The Upper Concord Street Neighborhood was the Center at Charleston's award-winning project. The eight-acre parcel in

downtown Charleston, was the largest unused publicly owned area in the city. And it was wholly undeveloped. Eighteen students from the Center at Charleston, affiliated with Clemson University's School of Architecture, leapt at the opportunity to study and to offer their design ideas for redeveloping the site. Joining them in this semester-long project were Robert J. Miller, AIA, associate professor and director of the Center, Ray Huff, AIA, a local practitioner, and two city representatives, Timothy J. Keane, director of planning and neighborhoods, and Michael T. Maher, director of civic design.

The result of this sustained, combined effort—one that fully breached any existing gaps between practice and education—was a well-received week-long public design charrette, which provided the guiding

vision for the parcel's redevelopment.

The Center was recognized by the 2003 NCARB Prize jury for the breadth and depth of its work and for establishing a high standard of accomplishment for other programs to emulate. The jurors were especially pleased to witness the Center's efforts to fully integrate the many stakeholders affected by parcel redevelopment into the discussion. As Professor Miller explains, "Our project teaches that public involvement can bring ideas, values, and support to civic design into the process; that design can be public—and not just a personal matter; and that architects need the skill and courage to open the design process to the public."

We congratulate Clemson University's School of Architecture on this well-deserved award!

When Is An Architect Required?

On May 7, 2003, the Board approved the following interpretation of Section 40-3-290 of the South Carolina Architectural Registration Law. This section gives exemptions to the requirement that an architect design and seal plans for buildings in this state, i.e., when an architect is not required. This interpretation is provided as a guide for building officials, permitting authorities, architects, owners, contractors and citizens in determining when architectural services are required and when such professional services are not required.

Interpretation of Section 40-3-290. Exemptions

Section 40-3-290 of the South Carolina statutes governing the practice of architecture outlines specific instances when an architect is NOT required for the design of a building. Such situations include farm buildings, detached single-family dwellings, two-family dwellings (duplexes), and buildings less than 3 stories in height and containing less than 5,000 square feet of total floor area. An architect IS required, however, if the building that is less than 5,000 square feet is classified as one of assembly, institutional, educational or hazardous occupancy by the Standard Building Code. An architect is required for these buildings regardless of their size.

[The State of South Carolina has adopted the 2000 International Building Code for use statewide. Section 40-3-290 has not yet been updated to reflect this change.]

For instances where there may be confusion regarding the language in other parts of this statute, the Board of Architectural Examiners provides the following guidance:

- All buildings of assembly, regardless of size, require the services of an architect.

Assembly uses include, but are not limited to, movie theaters, banquet halls, nightclubs, restaurants, art galleries, churches, courtrooms, funeral parlors, libraries, museums and stadiums.

- All institutional buildings, regardless of size, require the services of an architect.

Institutional buildings include, but are not limited to, residential board and care facilities, assisted living facilities, halfway houses, group homes, congregate care facilities, social rehabilitation facilities, alcohol and drug centers, hospitals, nursing homes, mental hospitals, jails, adult care facilities, and day care facilities for more than five children younger than 2 1/2 years of age.

- All educational facilities, regardless of size, require the services of an architect. Educa-

tional facilities include day care facilities for more than five children older than 2 1/2 years of age.

- All hazardous use facilities, regardless of size, require the services of an architect.

- Residential buildings that house more than two families require the services of an architect.

Residential buildings include boarding houses, hotels, apartment houses, townhouses, convents, dormitories, fraternity/sorority houses and monasteries.

Upfits and Alterations

Section 40-3-290(C)(4) is interpreted to mean that upfits or alterations to a building that is less than 5,000 square feet and less than 3 stories in height do not require the services of an architect *unless* the alterations will increase the area of the building beyond 5,000 square feet or affect the structural safety of the building. If either the building size or structural safety is affected by the alteration, the services of an architect are required. If the use of a building changes to become one of assembly, institutional, educational or hazardous occupancy, the services of an architect are required.

Designs for alterations inside of a building that exceed 5,000 square feet must also be done by an architect. Example: a former

warehouse (30,000 square feet) is now used for retail shops such as fast foods, gift shops or personal services (tanning beds, manicure salons). Alterations to any one of these spaces require the services of an architect, even though the retail space is less than 5,000 square feet. The overall life/safety issues of the total building must be considered as a whole. The Board believes that piecemeal changes to individual business spaces, over time, may adversely affect the safety of the individuals who use the building. For this reason, an architect should coordinate the changes to the smaller retail space within the overall layout of the entire building. The same principle applies to strip shopping centers and malls where one of the retail spaces is being renovated for a new tenant.

Building Officials

Section 40-3-320 states, "The building official or other authority charged with the responsibility of issuing building or other similar permits of any county, municipality or other subdivision, before issuing the permit, must be in possession of a sealed set of plans and specifications for which the seal of a registered architect is required and to verify that the architect who sealed the architectural plans and specifications is an architect registered in South Carolina."

Board of Architecture Provides Support

The Board of Architecture provides Clemson University's Gunnin Architecture Library with monetary support for the purchase of library materials, to the mutual benefit of both partners. Clemson University Libraries will extend library privileges to all architects licensed in South Carolina free of charge. You may search the library catalog from on- or off-campus at www.lib.clemson.edu to locate books available at Clemson. To use databases such as the Avery Index, it is necessary to search on-campus because of database licensing issues. However, there are two librarians available in Gunnin who will be happy to search databases on issues of interest, provide citations, and mail, e-mail or send by fax complete articles free of charge. They will mail books

to licensed architects who reside in South Carolina. If you live outside South Carolina and find books of interest in the catalog, you may request them through Interlibrary Loan at your local public library.
