CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: This meeting is called to 2 Public notice of this meeting was properly 3 posted at the South Carolina Athletic 4 Commission office, Synergy Business Park, 5 Kingstree Building, and on the commission 6 website, and provided to any requesting 7 persons, organizations, or news media in compliance with 30-4-80 of the South Carolina 8 9 Freedom of Information Act. The first order of 10 business is the approval of the agenda. Does 11 everyone have a copy of the agenda? 12 COMMISSION: (No response.) 13 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Does anyone need a copy? Hearing 14 none, are there any motions to approve the 15 agenda? 16 MR. D'ANDREA: I make a motion to approve the agenda. 17 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Bill has made a motion to approve 18 the agenda. Any seconds? 19 MR. BATES: I second the motion. 20 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: That's Coleman, second the motion. 21 All those in favor? 22 COMMISSION: Aye. 23 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Any opposed? 24 COMMISSION: (No response.) 25 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Motion passed. Moving on to the

5	DR. VAUGHT: This is Dillon. Was there any reason as
6	to why?
7	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: I do not have that information,
8	no. No word from Dr. Phillips.
9	DR. VAUGHT: This is Dillon. I make a motion to not
10	excuse his absence.
11	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: We have a motion to not excuse Dr.
12	Phillips' absence. Is there a second?
13	MR. D'ANDREA: I'll second.
14	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Second, thank you. All those in
15	favor, aye?
16	COMMISSION: Aye.
17	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Any opposed? Hearing none, the
18	motion carries. Also approval, unexcused
19	absence, Ms. Pam Shealey Wright. Is there a
20	motion to Ms. Shealey's absence?
21	MR. D'ANDREA: I'll make a motion to not excuse Ms.
22	Shealey.
23	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: We have a motion. Is here a
24	second?
25	MR. BATES: I second the motion.

1	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: We have a second. All those in
2	favor?
3	COMMISSION: Aye.
4	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Any opposed?
5	COMMISSION: (No response.)
6	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Motion carries. So unexcused
7	absence, that's the only two we're missing,
8	correct?
9	MR. HORNER: Yes.
10	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Okay. We'll move on to the
11	approval of minutes. I think everyone has been
12	provided these as well, either via email or
13	paper copy. Does everyone have a copy of the
14	minutes from the previous they are long.
15	Give everybody a few minutes to look through it
16	and make sure. Is there a motion as to the
17	approval of the minutes?
18	DR. VAUGHT: This is Dillon. I'll make a motion to
19	approve the minutes.
20	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Thank you, Dillon. Is there a
21	second?
22	MR. D'ANDREA: This is Bill. I make a
23	DR. KENNEMORE: This is Hamp. I second.
24	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: All those in favor?
25	COMMISSION: Aye.

1 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Any opposed? 2 COMMISSION: (No response.) 3 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: The motion passes for approval of Moving right along to the 4 the minutes. 5 chairperson's remarks. That would be me, and I 6 know some of you guys are as surprised as I am 7 to see me sitting right here. So, that being 8 said, I'm going to pass on my remarks and we're 9 going to move on down the agenda and let things 10 explain itself. Next we have Will McCullough. 11 MR. McCULLOUGH: Well, hello. So, thank you, Mr. 12 Chairperson, and thank you, staff, for allowing 13 me this opportunity to have some remarks on the 14 agenda today. I'm not normally much for 15 written stuff as far as statements. I like to 16 shoot from the hip. In this case I thought I'd 17 just share some info with y'all right quick. 18 About five and a half years ago I was appointed 19 for a period of four years to the South 20 Carolina State Athletic Commission, by then-21 Governor Nikki Haley. It doesn't take a lot of 22 difficult math to recognize that I've been 23 serving on a bit of borrowed time, and it was 24 inevitable that the new governor would 25 eventually fill my technically-expired seat

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1	from the 1st Congressional District. And that
2	has indeed come to pass. After three
3	consecutive terms serving as the chairman of
4	this commission, I wanted each and every member
5	of the South Carolina fighting community to
6	know that it has been an absolute honor
7	serving, having the opportunity to serve y'all.
8	I'm also very proud of what all of us as a
9	board and as LLR staff have been able to
10	accomplish over the last several years. We
11	strove to create a safer environment for
12	fighting sports in our state, to reduce cost
13	for licensees while simultaneously increasing
14	revenue and minimizing needless bureaucracy and
15	regulation; and we've seen, via the LFA event
16	last year, our first ever nationally televised
17	MMA event. We've also been the first state
18	ever in the Union to sanction two-on-two MMA
19	events. We're one of the first states to vote
20	to adopt the new unified rules of MMA. And
21	we'll soon be hosting not only our first ever
22	King of the Cage event, but also in June our
23	first ever UFC event here in South Carolina.
24	Bottom line, after many years of hard work
25	South Carolina is finally on the map as it

1	relates to the professional combat sports
2	world, and I'm very excited to see where we as
3	a state will grow from here. But while our
4	accomplishments over the last several years are
5	many, there is one that matters to me
6	personally above all others. I believe that we
7	have succeeded in becoming a board that
8	listens. One that nurtures and encourages open
9	dialogue, debate and discussion with the
10	fighting community that we serve via these
11	forums and recognize that we are here to serve,
12	not to be served. South Carolina now finds
13	itself poised on the edge of great things in
14	the combat sports arena, and we have everyone
15	in this room and many that aren't here with us
16	today, not just board members or LLR staff, but
17	more so the fighters, promoters, officials and
18	other licensees, to thank for their open and
19	honest feedback over the years. I may not
20	personally have always agreed with everyone in
21	this room or on any given topic or ultimately
22	made a decision that you've agreed with, but
23	please know that I've always done my best to
24	listen, to weigh different perspectives, and to
25	make the best personal decisions my conscience

1	would allow. Now, over the last over the
2	last time that I've been on the board, so like
3	I say, over five years now I'll be coming
4	into my sixth year, on a four-year term
5	during that same period of time we've seen a
6	total of eight different people fill various
7	administrative roles in that time. Over the
8	course of just the last several months we lost
9	our most recent administrator before Eric, we
10	lost Sym Singh, who was very proactive in the -
11	- I'm not taking away from Eric, by the way,
12	I'm just saying we've had a list of folks over
13	the course of the last six or seven months who
14	have departed their service to the board. Sym
15	Singh was a great administrator, now he's moved
16	on to greener pastures. We lost our very
17	outspoken and articulate vice chair, Derek
18	Shoemake, who was not only a great communicator
19	and had a love of the fighting sports, but a
20	brilliant legal mind. So we lost him. Just
21	last week we lost Charlie, who has been serving
22	and assisting the administrator. And that's a
23	blow to the commission as far a things working
24	logistically. Bob over here as legal counsel
25	has been doing a great job, but he has stepped

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1	in over the most recent months to replace
2	Hardwick Stuart, Wick Stuart, who was for many,
3	many years our legal counsel. All of those
4	individuals, and several others who have
5	departed over time, have been part of the
6	conversation that's taken place now for many
7	years of ongoing things going on with this
8	commission. Things that people have came in
9	and presented about, topics that we've debated
10	and discussed, they were part of those
11	conversations. It's not the Will McCullough
12	show. It's not it was never meant to be
13	that. But I, just by logistics, am the only
14	person remaining of that core of folks who were
15	part of those decisions for quite some time. I
16	accepted this appointment because I really
17	wanted to serve both the state that I love and
18	the fighting community that I love, that's been
19	so good to me. It would be a travesty I
20	believe to just leave that blind at this time.
21	And because of that, and in discussions with
22	the board, I called well, I'm technically no
23	longer a board member. But while I was still
24	chair a few weeks ago, I called knowing that
25	this was coming and in the works, I called a

1	special meeting of the board and I made the
2	following this has already passed, but I
3	wanted to at least put it I don't think it
4	was recorded on that day, so I wanted to put it
5	on the public record and explain to the
6	fighting community what happened. So I made a
7	motion we had a special meeting to discuss
8	this topic specifically, and I made the
9	following motion which subsequently passed.
10	And I'll just read it to you verbatim. I would
11	like once again to clarify, I'm not making this
12	motion now; we're going back in time, so just
13	pretend. "I'd like to make a motion that we as
14	a board create a special advisor to the board
15	position. This special advisor would attend
16	meetings and provide guidance, opinion and
17	advice directly to the board leading up to
18	events, as well as observing events on sites
19	for the purpose of being to report back to
20	the board with suggestions on potential changes
21	that the board may wish to implement to improve
22	safety, service and logistical procedures. The
23	special advisor must be a willing private
24	individual, with a preference for previous
25	experience serving as a board member of the

1	South Carolina State Athletic Commission, and
2	will be appointed by the board via a majority
3	vote. The special advisor will conduct
4	themselves under the same ethical standards at
5	events and meetings as would an active board
6	member and will hold no authority over staff,
7	licensees or board members. This position will
8	be voluntary and completely fiscally
9	uncompensated. The term of this specific
10	position is one calendar year, and this term
11	begins upon appointment date. The position may
12	be extended for additional one-year terms by a
13	majority vote of the board." That was
14	subsequently voted and passed. Then Dr. Dillon
15	Vaught made a follow-up motion. He motioned
16	that, "I would like to move that should current
17	board chair Will McCullough cease serving on
18	the board between now and our meeting scheduled
19	for August 13th, 2019, that he will be
20	appointed to the special advisor to the board
21	position effective August 12th, 2019, or upon
22	the date of his cessation of service to the
23	board, whichever date is earlier." So that has
24	come to pass. So I personally am no longer a
25	board member, I am no longer the chair; I am

1	now the special advisor to the board. I want
2	to make it clear while I have this opportunity
3	to do so, that that is not in any way intended
4	to be a de facto board position, even though
5	I'm just sitting up here at this moment. Nor
6	is it to be kind of controlling the strings and
7	do a puppet it's none of that. It's to do
8	everything that I can in my own little personal
9	service to this state and the fighting
10	community in making sure that the things that
11	we have talked about in the past, there is a
12	live memory of them that can be discussed and
13	assist. And also, because of my experience in
14	the fighting sports and as the chair, to
15	provide guidance and opinions as we move
16	forward, but to have no authority. So to make
17	that clear, I'm not voting, I'm not and we
18	didn't mention this, but I was asking counsel,
19	if there is a scenario where we go in to
20	executive session or something like that, I
21	don't I think that if there is any input
22	that I ever have the opportunity to make to the
23	board, that it is as a result of being asked
24	for it. And then if there is ever something
25	so I'm not an active participant in the

1	meeting, but if you say, "Hey, Will, what about
2	this?" I'll give that opinion. And then
3	furthermore, if there's a scenario where
4	there's executive session or something like
5	that, that's not me. That is the board.
6	Anything that I ever have to say to the board
7	is in the open. It's not a private thing.
8	That being said, there are avenues that will
9	allow me to potentially come back on as a board
10	member. But as most of us know, the wheels of
11	government moves slow. I am actively pursuing
12	that. Whether or not it will come to that
13	remains to be seen. But know that it's
14	important to me to have that opportunity to
15	continue to serve should it be allowed by our
16	current governor. And none of that, none of
17	that should take away from our new board member
18	from the 1st Congressional District, Mr.
19	Coleman Bates, who I would like to be the first
20	to publically welcome. He came in here. He's
21	got a lot of enthusiasm. He's excited about
22	going to events. He's got a good head on his
23	shoulders, and I'd like to be the first person
24	to welcome him to the board. So welcome,
25	Coleman, it's great to have you here. And with

1 that, I'm going to shut up. 2 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Well, now that that kind of clears 3 everything up, you guys will have to bear with me a little bit as I muddle through this. 4 5 Because this is my first time doing this here, 6 so. 7 MR. D'ANDREA: Mr. Chairman? 8 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Yes, sir? MR. D'ANDREA: First of all, we'd like to welcome you 9 10 as the new chairman. But I just want to echo a 11 little bit of what Will has said. I do think 12 his passion, his experience, and just his 13 professionalism that he's brought to this 14 committee, he certainly would bring consistency 15 and his experience and some of the policies and 16 whatnot. And if you'll look at the direction 17 we have gone as an athletic commission, I think 18 it's -- a lot of it is attributed to his 19 leadership. My question is, you would not be 20 able to serve as a special advisor and be on 21 the board as well? 22 MR. McCULLOUGH: To answer your question, no. The 23 special advisor position was --MR. D'ANDREA: It'd be one or the other --24 25 MR. McCULLOUGH: -- created to allow an opportunity

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1	MR. D'ANDREA: Okay.
2	MR. McCULLOUGH: to give opinion and guidance
3	based on that experience, but without any
4	authority. If at some point I am allowed the
5	opportunity by the current governor to come
6	back on the board, then that would cease. I
7	would, I would
8	MR. D'ANDREA: Well, maybe
9	MR. McCULLOUGH: step away from that position. But
10	because that position was created, another
11	MR. D'ANDREA: Yeah, person could step in there.
12	MR. McCULLOUGH: person could fill that. And I
13	think that that's maybe a good path for smooth
14	transitions in the future in a comparable
15	scenario.
16	MR. D'ANDREA: You answered my question.
17	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: And thank you for everything that
18	you've done. I don't want you to think that we
19	don't appreciate everything that you have done
20	in the past. I guess I'm kind of new, so I
21	didn't prepare a speech for you. But
22	MR. McCULLOUGH: Thank you, Mack. It's the fighters
23	that are important, so we just want things to
24	keep going smooth for them.
25	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Well, we will trudge on then.

1	Next on the agenda, Administrator's Remarks.
2	MR. THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. First, we'll
3	cover the budget. I sent a copy, and it is
4	also in the hard form for you guys before you.
5	Our beginning balance was about \$438,507.47.
6	We had total revenue taken in was
7	\$115,446.45. We had direct expenditures of
8	\$45,690.33. And as you know, we are currently
9	running a net deficit, bringing a year-to-date
10	of \$368,814.35. This is a different format
11	than what you've seen previously. We have a
12	new member down in finance, and he basically
13	gave the breakdown of our direct expenditures
14	as to what actually was paid out. Everything
15	down to materials, supplies, travel, etcetera.
16	So this is the accurate report as of today. In
17	addition to the budget, we currently have about
18	1086 licensees. Back in December everybody
19	ended that was licensed prior to November. We
20	had to do some cleaning up. And I told the
21	previous chair that we would have a more
22	accurate number, and that number today is 1086
23	licensees in athletics. As you can see, we do
24	have a vacancy in our program coordinator
25	position. That position has been posted. That

1	position will close on May 5th. The previous
2	coordinator decided to go back into the
3	restaurant business, so. He said he wanted to
4	give us a year, he gave us a year, and so he
5	went back into the restaurant business. So we
6	have a vacancy there. In terms of upcoming
7	events, May 11th we have the King of the Cage
8	is coming to North Augusta. On June 15th we
9	will have boxing here at Jamil Temple. That
10	will be Stokes Production. Of course, June
11	22nd we will have the UFC up in Greenville.
12	And July 13, and I'm thinking that's probably
13	far enough to go for now, July 13 we will have
14	boxing down in Charleston. So we've got two
15	boxing and two MMA events coming up in the next
16	two, three months.
17	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Fantastic.
18	MR. THOMPSON: As far as the OIE and the IRC report,
19	there was no report. I forwarded to what the
20	chief I think he stepped in and out but
21	that we didn't have anything to present to the
22	IRC, and there was no OIE report as well as the
23	ODC. So we haven't had any cases to bring
24	forth, so.
25	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Okay.

1 MR. THOMPSON: No report on any of those. 2 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: No news is good news sometimes on 3 that. MR. THOMPSON: But before closing, and if I'm in order 4 5 -- I just want to make sure -- speaking with 6 the chair, you said that you may have to leave 7 the country. And so now that we've got 8 everybody on, we have an event that's going to 9 be coming up in a week and a half, so I would 10 need to forward that fight card to someone, 11 either you or your proxy. 12 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Yeah, I have to leave the country 13 for just a little while, so the fight cards 14 that come up and have to be approved, I would 15 like to ask -- I hate to put him on the spot --16 Hamp, I know you're on the phone, I think you 17 have the most seniority on the board. If you 18 would take on those and speak --19 DR. KENNEMORE: Yes, that's fine. Yeah, I can do 20 that, Mack. 21 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: -- and speak with Will and work 22 that out in my absence. And I apologize to 23 throw that on you as well. 24 DR. KENNEMORE: Mack? 25 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Yes, sir? Hamp, you there?

1 DR. VAUGHT: I think they might have muted it. 2 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: There you go. Okay. So if you're good with that, you know -- and if you're not, 3 that's okay, we'll work around it; but I hate 4 5 to put you on the spot. But if you're good 6 with that, I'm going to leave that in your 7 hands. 8 MR. THOMPSON: I'll reach out to you. I'll reach out 9 to him. That concludes the administrator 10 remarks. 11 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: All right. Well, we'll move on to 12 New Business. It looks like we have lots of 13 new business. Upcoming Events, Discussion, 14 Board Members Attending. I think we've covered 15 the upcoming events, you covered that. 16 MR. THOMPSON: No, the special advisor would like to 17 address some of those issues. 18 (Telephone connection lost.) 19 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Back to where we were. We're on 20 New Business. We were waiting for Will to 21 rejoin us, and we will move along. Here he 22 comes now. We got the phone working. We are 23 back to business. 24 MR. McCULLOUGH: So, Mr. Chair, I believe that you had 25 mentioned upcoming events as the next thing,

1	and I thank you again for allowing me the
2	opportunity to talk about this. So we have
3	lots of upcoming events, but the one
4	specifically that, with your permission, I'd
5	just like to offer some thoughts on
6	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Yes, please.
7	MR. McCULLOUGH: is the upcoming UFC on June 22nd.
8	A couple of weeks ago Matt Woodruff, who is the
9	executive director of the Georgia sorry, I'm
10	out of breath. I ran when I heard the all
11	right, I'm ready. He's the executive director
12	of the Georgia commission. They just had a UFC
13	event in Atlanta a couple of weeks back, and he
14	was kind enough to reach out both to myself and
15	to Eric and invite us to come down and attend
16	and observe that UFC cage-side, see everything
17	backstage and see how it all ran. Really kind
18	invitation. We have a lot of experience of
19	course in our own regional and local events,
20	but just you can't really appreciate the
21	scale of that event until you're there and see
22	it, and they really run a tight ship. I mean,
23	it's a big, big production. And it was
24	invaluable to have that opportunity to observe
25	it firsthand and kind of walk through with

1	Georgia, how they were doing everything. And
2	myself and staff have already had, you know,
3	meetings about that to discuss some details. I
4	just want to mention a couple of things that
5	came up of it because well, one, just some
6	takeaways: One, whoever attends, like if you're
7	a board member and you are going to be
8	attending that event to observe, they are going
9	to get you a set of credentials in advance.
10	One thing you do not want to do I know Eric
11	is going to cover this with staff, but my
12	recommendation to you is to make sure if you're
13	attending that event and they give you
14	credentials, do not take a picture of those
15	credentials and then post them on your social
16	media. That is a very big negative and a great
17	way for you to be invited to leave that event
18	immediately. Last well, I won't go into too
19	great of detail, but they had somebody did
20	that at the Conor McGregor fight last summer,
21	whenever it was, and they posted their
22	credentials online. Some intuitive little kid
23	online got on there, copied that, went
24	backstage. You don't share your credentials on
25	social media. I also recommend don't get

1	inside the cage and try to take pictures. I
2	mean, you're there to observe. So those are
3	just things that we kind of do sometimes on
4	regional shows. Do not take pictures of your
5	credentials, do not share them on social media.
6	Don't take pictures in the cage. There's going
7	to be celebrities there. Don't hound them; I
8	mean, just let them be. The only area and I
9	had discussed this with Eric just to kind of
10	share it for our own experience. They run such
11	a tight ship themselves in how they do
12	everything, the only area where the commission
13	was really put under pressure was the
14	tabulating of scores in between rounds. So in
15	between each round they are coming around
16	really quick and taking a picture of that score
17	card and see how the judges scored it. And as
18	soon as the bout is over they want to know that
19	result because they are running on a timeline.
20	So they are going to be standing over Eric's
21	shoulder trying to get the scores we've
22	already discussed that, but that was a good
23	takeaway from it and how that goes out.
24	Something else that I had mentioned to Eric and
25	just to kind of put out there, especially with

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1	legal counsel here, that you might want to talk
2	about, is if there is a stoppage by a referee,
3	if a referee stops
4	(Reporter clarification.)
5	MR. McCULLOUGH: If a referee has a stoppage that in
6	any way could be considered questionable, there
7	may well be press that wants to know why that
8	was stopped. I would suggest that you don't
9	want press going and badgering a referee. Most
10	certainly not during an event or after it. So
11	what Matt Woodruff of Georgia had recommended,
12	which we've passed on to Eric and we'd want to
13	pass on to our officials, is if there is a bout
14	that they stop for whatever reason, if the
15	referee stops it, that that referee then
16	immediately comes to staff, to Eric, and
17	explains to Eric why that was stopped. So if
18	somebody has to speak for the commission as to
19	why this got stopped, it's not a referee; he's
20	there trying to do his job.
21	MR. D'ANDREA: And that event is June 22nd in
22	Greenville, right?
23	MR. McCULLOUGH: That event is June 22nd in
24	Greenville. And I'll tell you something, now,
25	I once again, not the Will McCullough show,

1	but since coming on the board I've gone to as
2	many events as I could possibly go to, and I
3	can say I'm shocked that that doesn't happen
4	more often with us. I mean, y'all have the
5	opportunity to go to these, sit ringside, cage-
6	side, and observe. And I think because so few
7	of us have a background in combat sports stuff,
8	that experience is invaluable. You know, not
9	just the UFC events because it's a big thing,
10	but go to these events. Because that's the
11	chance to see what's going on and be able to
12	then come back and help that create a
13	foundation for the decisions that you're going
14	to make. You know, it shouldn't be a scenario
15	all the time where the folks that are out there
16	asking for changes also have to kind of educate
17	why those changes are needed. So I encourage
18	everybody to go to the events. But one thing
19	to note and I've had to learn this too as I
20	started going to events when you're there as
21	a board member, you're there to observe. Staff
22	runs that show. You're not there to make
23	decisions or to influence anything anyway.
24	You're there to observe, in my opinion, to help
25	better do this. So, you know, you're not there

1	to make decisions for staff; let them do their
2	thing. And on that, this was something we
3	hadn't talked about but it occurred to me, and
4	I wanted to mention this with legal counsel
5	here, there is I know, I wrote it down,
6	Section 30-4-70 and 30-4-20 of the South
7	Carolina Code, it references about a quorum, or
8	even the illusion of a quorum. So if you
9	and I'm just explaining this in my own layman
10	way. My understanding, that if three if a
11	quorum of board members gather somewhere and
12	it's a potential for a discussion on a topic
13	about which they're responsible for governing,
14	that creates a meeting, a de facto meeting, or
15	at least creates a potential or illusion of
16	one. So when you talk about inviting board
17	members and whatnot to this event, I would seek
18	legal guidance from counsel on whether or not $-$
19	- what constitutes a quorum and how that should
20	be handled. If you've got four board members
21	there and they're in a position to discuss that
22	event, if there is a Freedom of Information
23	thing, I mean that's essentially a de facto
24	meeting in my layman's perspective. So just
25	something to be aware of that y'all we don't

1	have to solve that now. We not we, you
2	don't have to solve that now, but
3	MR. HORNER: You're correct.
4	MR. McCULLOUGH: Okay.
5	MR. HORNER: It's the same with emails. If a couple
6	of you get together and only include four of
7	you on a email, and you started talking about a
8	certain topic and you all say, "Hey, I think
9	this is a great idea, this is a great idea.
10	This is a great idea, everybody thinks this is
11	a great idea. Yeah, let's bring it up to the
12	board," you've already established a quorum and
13	voted on it on behalf of the board. Now, that
14	quorum was established without the proper
15	procedures through the Freedom of Information
16	Act, but it's FOIA'ble. So somebody who wants
17	to know your business can say show me all your
18	emails dealing with a UFC event, and if you
19	turn them over and voted on what flavor popcorn
20	you were going to have, that becomes a
21	violation of FOIA, it gets undone, we could be
22	forced to pay the attorneys fees of whoever
23	wanted to look into what we discussed outside
24	of this proper forum. So you always have to be
25	careful when you're chatting amongst any sort

1	of business, board business, where you're going
2	to end up taking a vote or deciding a course of
3	action. So, for example, I may send all of
4	y'all an email and it's about a legal issue and
5	legally I will tell you that it's bound by
6	attorney-client privilege, but you can only
7	respond to me. I am the attorney, respond to
8	me; when we get together at our regularly
9	called hearing or special called hearing, we
10	can then discuss the issue. Nobody has
11	violated FOIA because that is all attorney-
12	client protected. But merely because I am on
13	an email and seven of you decide to vote that
14	UFC participants have to wear green, at that
15	point it becomes a real vote. It is taken out
16	of the FOIA'ble context and it's an invalid
17	vote, which there are ramifications of. So
18	just like Will said, be careful of who your
19	company is, what company you're keeping, and
20	what discussions are undertaken.
21	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Well, how do we obviously with
22	events coming up and we want the board members
23	to attend and see these events firsthand and,
24	you know, by trying to get more board members
25	there, sooner or later you're going to have a

1	quorum of members there to see a fight, any one
2	fight. I mean, how does that
3	MR. HORNER: Well, if you're just there observing on
4	your own behalf and on behalf of the board and
5	you're learning something, what you can't do is
6	voice it out loud and have a de facto meeting
7	with a vote involved.
8	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Okay.
9	MR. HORNER: You're free to make all the notes you
10	want, and then next time y'all meet you say,
11	"Hey, I've got these notes from last time,
12	three of us were sitting at the meeting, four
13	of us were sitting at the fight. I asked them
14	all to take some notes on what they thought
15	about particular issues, we combined our notes
16	together, and this is what we'd like to put on
17	the agenda to have the board discuss going
18	forward."
19	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Okay. So as long as they observe,
20	note-taking, etcetera, etcetera, just as long
21	as there is no discussion
22	MR. HORNER: Or voting.
23	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Or voting.
24	MR. D'ANDREA: But we can discuss?
25	MR. HORNER: You can casually discuss it and say, wow,

1	I didn't you know, that's a I didn't I
2	never thought of that being a possibility, and
3	then one of you writes down "Possibility that,"
4	you know, we have
5	MR. D'ANDREA: Okay. Just as long as we bring it back
6	here?
7	MR. HORNER: Yeah. And then nothing happens out
8	there, but everything happens in here. So Will
9	is exactly right on that.
10	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Well, that's good to know and
11	it's, you know, fortunate and unfortunate I
12	guess that it could be an issue. But fortunate
13	that it may put us in a quorum together at
14	different events would be nice.
15	MR. McCULLOUGH: And if I may share one last thing on
16	that same topic. I know when we had met with
17	the UFC a month or so ago they mentioned about
18	people and inviting and whatnot. I don't know
19	the logistics of that or what's permitted or
20	not permitted or what we may have; however,
21	both former administrator Sym Singh and former
22	vice chair Derek Shoemake were exceptionally
23	positive and outgoing in their help of growth
24	and eventually bringing this particular event.
25	If there is an opportunity for us to invite

1	someone to attend, it would be wonderful if the
2	board was able to invite them, or staff was, to
3	be at that event. However, if that's not
4	possible, that's fine. I just wanted to put
5	that out there in the public realm, that I
6	think it would be an appropriate thing for them
7	to be able to see the fruits of their labor.
8	I'll be there working.
9	MR. THOMPSON: From what I gather from the meeting
10	with UFC, that's their call, so. I mean, we'll
11	start to nail that down a little bit. But we
12	really don't have any leeway in that, that's
13	all their that's on them.
14	MR. McCULLOUGH: Understood. I just wanted to put
15	that out there.
16	MR. HORNER: There are ethics rules about accepting,
17	you know, gifts over a certain value and the
18	exceptions to that and all of that. And I can
19	look into that just to double check in case all
20	five, all six, all seven of you get invites or
21	get, you know, comp seats or whatever the issue
22	is, as to the legalities of that or whether or
23	not you just need to reimburse it and have the
24	State pay you back for whatever was involved.
25	There are a lot of things I haven't had to run

1	into with the nursing board. Nobody gets a
2	free seat to an operation. But it's but
3	it's something I can look into. Several people
4	up here have had those issues.
5	MR. McCULLOUGH: If I may, on that specific topic,
6	just because it comes up: As a board member,
7	you know, I've traveled around the state and
8	I've been to many of y'all's events, and I've
9	always made it a policy as I'm there, I'm there
10	to observe, when I was a board member. But my
11	wife travels with me. So I would always make
12	it a point of paying that promoter for that
13	ticket for my spouse who was there with me. I
14	don't know for the board members who may be
15	attending this particular event if that's an
16	option or not, but I could understand somebody
17	being interested in doing that, six hours away,
18	when they go observe this thing. So that may
19	be something the board wants to at least look
20	at, if a spouse would be with them or whatever.
21	Not my business, but just putting it out there
22	for thoughts, for whose business it is. And,
23	Mr. Chair, I very much appreciate having that
24	opportunity to run my mouth on that.
25	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Certainly. Any other board

1	members, any other comments, questions,
2	concerns in regards to that topic? Hearing
3	none, we will move forward to five percent gate
4	fees and a cap on fees.
5	MR. THOMPSON: That would be the special advisor
6	again. Some of these discussions
7	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Well, that's good, because I don't
8	have a whole lot of discussion on this, so.
9	MR. THOMPSON: This came about from the UFC, so.
10	MR. McCULLOUGH: Well, what is our what is the
11	commission's current can you frame that
12	discussion insofar as why
13	(Cross talk)
14	MR. THOMPSON: there was a cap on it, and so the
15	question came up from Mr. Ratner about the five
16	percent. And so I think Mr. Bryce (ph.) looked
17	into it at the time, and then at the moment
18	you just mentioned that we'd probably have a
19	discussion to see if there was anything in
20	there as far as leeway on the fees or whatever
21	kind of because he asked the question, and
22	we said it was a five percent cap. He was okay
23	with it, but we were just saying that we were
24	going to look at it.
25	MR. McCULLOUGH: If I may, because I think when that

1 discussion took place I was personally ignorant 2 of what our -- what our regula- -- not 3 regulation, but what our policy is on that. Do you know what it is offhand? 4 5 MR. THOMPSON: Bob, can you go to that section 6 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: I was going to ask the same thing 7 because I have no idea. 8 MR. THOMPSON: -- that section of the regulation 9 dealing with five percent gate fees? 10 MR. HORNER: Yeah. 11 MR. D'ANDREA: Do you happen to know what Georgia was? 12 MR. McCULLOUGH: I don't. No, I don't. The 13 conversation came up and they asked about that, 14 and I had mentioned it would probably be a good 15 thing for us to talk about at the meeting, but 16 I don't know what our current cap is. It may 17 be something that the commission needs to table 18 and do a little homework on and find out, Ι 19 mean, just to answer the specific question, 20 because it's not one that I personally can give 21 guidance on. 22 MR. THOMPSON: I think in that conversation, it --23 five percent was pretty much clear; where the 24 question really came in to was the TV. 25 MR. McCULLOUGH: Which, what is the commission

1	because that only came up with the LFA event we
2	had last year, where there was a question about
3	what cut of their TV stuff we get. I don't
4	know, because this only ever happened once.
5	MR. THOMPSON: They are saying it was ten percent, and
6	then there was some discussion that there was
7	previous history that we or that the board
8	or the commission voted not to.
9	MR. D'ANDREA: Not to take it?
10	MR. THOMPSON: Yeah. That's what the discussion was.
11	MR. McCULLOUGH: Well, I would guide that it would be
12	prudent for us to look at what we did for the
13	LFA event and make sure that that's documented
14	and recreated. I mean, I think that's just a -
15	- there's probably a and no fault to Eric,
16	he's got about a million things in the air.
17	But that's probably something that it would be
18	best for staff to look into, what we've charged
19	and what we're telling them.
20	MR. HORNER: All right.So let me know if this is the
21	right section. It is Regulation 20-4.8,
22	"Promoters must pay to the commission the
23	higher amount of either five percent of the
24	total gross admissions received at the event or
25	a \$25 minimum gate fee within 30 days after the

event." 1 2 MR. THOMPSON: That's the right section. 3 MR. McCULLOUGH: So with regard to the admissions, 4 that's actually butts in seats, so the 25 is 5 more for like the low-level wrestling 6 promotions and whatnot. So that's going to be 7 applicable; I think that's the answer to the 8 question on that. With regard to the TV thing, 9 I don't know if we have a regulation in there -10 - oh, I think we do. 11 MR. THOMPSON: It speaks to -- just a little bit 12 further down, Bob. 13 MR. HORNER: Okay. I'll find it. 14 MR. McCULLOUGH: Whatever the answers to that question 15 are, my guidance would be that you consider 16 reaching out then with those specific answers 17 to the UFC. And if, for any reason, based off 18 their experience in other states, there is a 19 genuine reason for push back, I would recommend 20 the chair considers having a special meeting to 21 see if it's something addressable at the board 22 level, to be more in line with what the 23 standard is. 24 MR. THOMPSON: Starting 2013.4. 25 MR. HORNER: -- 5. .4 or 5? 5.
1 MR. THOMPSON: It's 5, yeah. 2 MR. HORNER: Okay. I'm looking for -- well, it says -3 - I don't know how y'all have done this in the It says -- all right, so 20-13.1 says 4 past. 5 Commission Fee. "Every person, club, 6 corporation, organization or association who 7 shall hold any boxing, wrestling, kickboxing, 8 full contact karate or sparring exhibition or 9 performance in this state shall pay to the 10 commission ten percent of the gross receipts 11 received by reason of the lease or sale of 12 television, moving picture or radio rights in 13 connection with any such exhibit or 14 performance." And it has a separate section 15 for closed circuit television. "Any person who 16 charges and receives admission for fees for 17 exhibiting via closed circuit TV, any boxing or 18 sparring match, including kickboxing, full 19 contact karate or wrestling exhibitions, must 20 obtain from the Athletic Commission an annual 21 license. Application for the annual license is 22 a \$50 fee. Additionally, such person must 23 apply to the commission for a permit for each 24 location where the telecast will be shown at 25 least two weeks in advance. If they don't meet

1	the deadline the commission will not issue the
2	permit until he pays the fine. There shall be
3	no penalty. Each application for a permit has
4	a \$50 certified fund fee for each location at
5	which the event will be telecast. Fees for
6	locations are arranged after the permit has
7	been submitted to the commission and 24 hours
8	after arrangements have been made. The
9	promoter may elect to pay a permit fee of \$1000
10	at the time of the permit application in lieu
11	of \$50 per location."
12	MR. McCULLOUGH: If I may, I believe that the latter
13	portion of that is dealing with closed circuits
14	specifically where they're broadcasting it to
15	another physical site where it's being shown.
16	I think it sounds to me like the initial part
17	is essentially ten percent of their online
18	broadcast. I would recommend to the board that
19	they consider really ironing down this one
20	specific topic because of that becoming a point
21	of great contention on large dollar amounts
22	both for the state and for that promoter. Also
23	I think, convoluting that, if my understanding
24	is correct with the way the UFC does things
25	now, they have recently entered into an

1	agreement with ESPN Plus, where people have
2	memberships for that and then get their then
3	will purchase the pay-per-view via that venue.
4	So obviously I don't believe the commission is
5	probably entitled to any with regard to ESPN's
6	cut, but probably the cut they pay for a
7	specific thing. That's where it should like
8	I say, I just believe that that's probably a
9	nut that needs cracked because it's a big deal.
10	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: So it's your opinion that we may
11	need to reduce that?
12	MR. McCULLOUGH: I have no opinion on that topic,
13	whether or not
14	MR. THOMPSON: I think what we've kind of gathered
15	from the understanding is that we can try to
16	seek it but it could be held that it's not our
17	rights, it's ESPN's rights, and they have the
18	right to hold whatever show whatever, we
19	still would get nothing. So, it's just
20	MR. D'ANDREA: We would still get ten percent,
21	wouldn't we
22	MR. THOMPSON: Well
23	MR. D'ANDREA: if it went on ESPN?
24	MR. THOMPSON: Ten percent, not really. The way it
25	was explained to me was that the promotion was

1	the promotion. ESPN was the one that was
2	putting it on, and they would be under that
3	mother craft of ESPN and they have their own
4	little deal that we would have to deal with.
5	But it wouldn't be the promotion who actually
6	got the permit.
7	MR. D'ANDREA: Okay.
8	MR. McCULLOUGH: It's obviously with all of the
9	logistics of managing and getting ready for
10	this big event that staff has to handle and
11	everything else, it's something that just
12	easily seems like a brush-aside'able, like, oh,
13	whatever. But it's a big deal. Not to say,
14	oh, the state's going to make money. But if
15	the state is entitled to a little bit of money
16	and they disagree with that, you wouldn't want
17	to create
18	MR. D'ANDREA: Right.
19	MR. McCULLOUGH: You don't want any questions on this,
20	whether it's zero or a number with lots of
21	zeros, no matter what that answer is, I would
22	recommend that we dial that you dial down on
23	that answer quickly, make sure they're aware of
24	that answer and work out any problems that
25	therein would come from it just so because

1	ultimately your goal is to encourage an
2	environment where they are going to come back
3	and have other events and other promotions are
4	going to do the same. But I think it's our
5	responsibility your responsibility to ensure
6	that that specific answer gets answered,
7	because anybody who is in business wants to
8	know how deep you're going to put your hands in
9	their pockets if so.
10	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Well, Eric, how would we need to -
11	- I mean, what would we need to do to proceed
12	to find out what their intentions are as far as
13	I mean, if they're still operating within
14	the state they would have some sort of footing
15	to stand on, but
16	MR. THOMPSON: They're operating within the state, but
17	we would have to kind of get with Bob just to
18	narrow down exactly whether they are actually
19	the parent or is ESPN the parent. And that's
20	where it's going to kind of decide whether we
21	can try to get something of the cookie jar.
22	MR. McCULLOUGH: And if I may on this specific topic,
23	the one advantage that you have as a board is
24	that you're not reinventing the wheel. Matt
25	Woodruff in Georgia just did that event last

1	week. Andy Foster out in California. My
2	recommendation would be that y'all and staff
3	CHAIRMAN THOMPSON: Reach out to those folks.
4	MR. McCULLOUGH: reach out to them and say, hey,
5	how does this work? And that's going to give
6	you the template for which to follow. But
7	ultimately you have to exist within a framework
8	of our own regulations. But, "How do y'all do
9	this? What do you do?" I would reach out to
10	them lickety split.
11	MR. THOMPSON: We got you.
12	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Perfect.
13	MR. HORNER: Well, and that one section does say the
14	commission can unanimously vote for a lesser
15	amount. So, I mean, there is like you said,
16	work it out sooner rather than later, and
17	whatever the answer may be.
18	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Yeah.
19	MR. HORNER: You know.
20	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Well, could you reach out to them
21	and just ask and see how they kind of smooth
22	things over so that we don't kind of
23	approach it the same way. Obviously if it's
24	working for them it can work for us, so.
25	MR. THOMPSON: Will do.

1	MR.	HORNER: Will, when you were in Georgia was that a
2		similar UFC event?
3	MR.	McCULLOUGH: That's exactly right.
4	MR.	THOMPSON: That was a UFC event.
5	MR.	McCULLOUGH: Yeah, that was I mean, it was
6		it was their UFC event there. It was probably
7		a bigger show than we're going to have. This
8		will still be the biggest one we've had. But
9		yeah, they
10	MR.	HORNER: We don't know what they did in Georgia as
11		far as
12	MR.	THOMPSON: I'll find out.
13	MR.	McCULLOUGH: But I'll tell you, they're they're
14		so it benefits the entire region to have
15		events.
16	MR.	HORNER: Yeah, promotion. Yeah.
17	MR.	McCULLOUGH: Yeah. Georgia has been very positive
18		about working with us, and I'm sure Eric will
19		have no hurdles in getting answers from them.
20	MR.	BATES: Do they have closed circuit there?
21	MR.	McCULLOUGH: No, closed circuit is often used in
22		events where it's packed. And then they have
23		an off-site location for overflow, or maybe
24		you're having your events here and you're
25		charging for butts in seats and different

1	things. So that's they're beyond that. I
2	don't think that's going to be an applicable
3	thing. To a degree it probably is with bars
4	and things like that, but I don't think that
5	will be applicable.
6	MR. HORNER: I mean, it doesn't in your experience
7	it hasn't included merely broadcasting it to
8	the box seats in the arena?
9	MR. McCULLOUGH: No, sir. No, sir.
10	MR. HORNER: Okay.
11	MR. McCULLOUGH: May I give you an example? Years and
12	years ago, when the WWE first came out with
13	Wrestle Mania and it was a new thing, they
14	would be having the actual Wrestle Mania in an
15	arena somewhere, and then you could buy tickets
16	because I was, you know, young at the time,
17	I bought tickets to go sit in an arena in Erie,
18	Pennsylvania, to watch it on a big screen, even
19	though the event itself was held hundreds of
20	miles away, and they would charge for that. So
21	that's where closed circuit was being utilized.
22	MR. D'ANDREA: Right.
23	MR. McCULLOUGH: It was previous to pay-per-view. So
24	I think that's kind of an antiquated tool for
25	this. It's getting is it the norm, because
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1	I don't know, is it the norm for a state to
2	receive a portion of their pay-per-view sales
3	in addition to their butts in seats? If it is
4	the norm, what is it that we as a state say
5	that we regulate and how in line is that with
6	other states? We want to be attractive for
7	these entities in a way that's at least
8	comparable to other states. You don't want to
9	leave money on the table, nor take something
10	that we're not entitled to. So I just believe
11	that it's something that as a board you
12	definitely want to iron out, and you don't want
13	it to be a week before the event. Because
14	ultimately they invented this stuff. So if
15	they say, you know they're a business and
16	they want as much in their pockets, as they
17	should, but I'd see what other states are
18	doing. And now I'm just getting redundant, so.
19	MR. HORNER: I did always think that the when you
20	go to a USC football game and they have all the
21	Cockabooses and they have their own TV sets and
22	you can't see into the stadium and you don't
23	have a ticket into the stadium, but you're
24	watching a game that's not even broadcast on
25	TV, that that is closed circuit TV for purposes

1	of that game because it is only offered to
2	whoever USC enters into an agreement to
3	broadcast that. And I know being in an arena
4	is different because they just, you know
5	you're at the game, you can see it with your
6	own two eyes; the fact they put it on the TV
7	doesn't necessarily make it closed circuit.
8	MR. McCULLOUGH: Well, your point is also valid
9	because, although my arena example is
10	antiquated, what they do have is commercial
11	my understanding is they do have commercial
12	agreements with like Buffalo Wild Wings, and
13	they will broadcast it there and then Buffalo
14	Wild Wings pays them a fee to have that. And
15	that may be something that other states somehow
16	do. I don't know. But what I'm saying
17	whether or not that should be is a I think
18	it would be good to get that info from other
19	states.
20	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Yeah.
21	MR. McCULLOUGH: And just see how they handle it. And
22	California is the tip of the spear with Mr.
23	Andy Foster, and Georgia is a local friend with
24	Matt Woodruff. I think you'll get those
25	answers quickly from them. Yes. Oh, sorry,

1 that's not my role. 2 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Yes, sir? Mr. Steele? 3 MR. STEELE: Don Steele. Years past, now this is 4 going back to the pay-per-view closed circuit 5 stuff, the venues would purchase it and then 6 y'all would go out and collect the fees from 7 the venues. So I don't know if that's changed 8 somewhat. I don't know if that has any bearing 9 on what y'all are talking about, but that's 10 happened years past. And I can tell you right 11 now, I don't think it's happening now because 12 there are so many people that are broadcasting 13 UFC and everybody else that y'all are missing 14 out on a lot of fees that the state could 15 acquire, just to let you know. 16 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Thank you, sir. I appreciate the 17 input, that's -- yeah, that's what we hope to 18 find out from Georgia and see. 19 MR. McCULLOUGH: If I might add one last -- the last 20 thing I would say on this is that we've all 21 collectively worked for a long time to help 22 foster an environment that allowed this type of 23 business to come to the state, grow, prosper 24 and do all that. So I would encourage us to 25 iron -- encourage you iron that down. But, for

1	lack of a better way to articulate it, don't
2	get greedy. I mean
3	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: We obviously want everybody to
4	come back and continue, so. Okay. Any other
5	discussion on that topic? Any other comments,
6	questions, concerns? Hearing none, we shall
7	move forward to the next item, New Business,
8	Justin Brown.
9	MR. THOMPSON: He has a proxy.
10	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Okay. I didn't see Justin here so
11	I figured Ms. Williams was going to speak on
12	his behalf.
13	MS. WILLIAMS: You've got me. Good morning, good
14	morning. Justin had a work emergency today and
15	he was unable to make it, so he asked for me to
16	speak on his behalf.
17	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Okay.
18	MS. WILLIAMS: And on behalf of USFMMA. So again,
19	good morning. Before I begin with what I want
20	to discuss, I just kind of wanted to make a
21	public mention that
22	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: One moment. Can you repeat your
23	name for the record?
24	MS. WILLIAMS: Diana Williams. Sorry. I just wanted
25	to say that Will

1	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Wait one second. Okay. Yeah,
2	okay. Just making sure. You're good. I'm
3	sorry.
4	MS. WILLIAMS: That's okay. I just wanted to say
5	that, you know, Will, you've been such an
6	instrumental part of the athletic commission.
7	I've been working in combat sports now for
8	almost 15 years, and you have been fair. And
9	your involvement, not only with the board and
10	having a board that works together, but also
11	just with working with all of the promotions,
12	the fighters, it's appreciated. And so I am
13	ecstatic that they have, you know, the board
14	itself has found a way to have you still be on
15	as an advisory member just to help to guide. I
16	think that's really important, you know, with
17	any board, and so I'm glad that we'll still
18	have an opportunity to see you within this
19	community.
20	MR. McCULLOUGH: Thank you.
21	MS. WILLIAMS: And so thank you again. As I
22	mentioned, my name is Diana Williams, and I was
23	recently nominated and approved and placed into
24	the position of an executive director of
25	USFMMA. USFMMA is the United States Federation

1	of Mixed Martial Arts, and it is a organization
2	for the U.S. that handles all of the athletics
3	for amateur mixed martial arts participants.
4	The mission of USFMMA is basically to empower
5	the U.S. athletes so we can help them to reach
6	a sustained competition level and, most
7	importantly, allow them to compete on a healthy
8	platform, a safe platform, and something that
9	allows them to reach their optimum status when
10	it comes to future Olympic recognition. I'm
11	not sure you have some new board members,
12	but in the past we have a lot of amateur mixed
13	martial arts athletes that are not given an
14	opportunity to compete safely. Through regular
15	regulation through state athletic commissions
16	throughout the U.S., many athletic amateur
17	athletes are forced to have to compete quickly
18	in order to receive purses. As we all know,
19	amateur fighters do not receive a purse. And
20	so for them to receive fair compensation for
21	their competitions, they are forced to reach
22	forced to compete and train on a pro level.
23	And many times that can be unhealthy. And I
24	know, Will, you're familiar with that. What
25	our board or our commission is doing is

1	we're not a commission, I'm sorry what our
2	organization is doing is basically to prepare
3	these fighters to compete on an Olympic level,
4	and then also giving them an opportunity to
5	have a voice within their own community. We're
6	asking today for a request for the board to
7	approve us to be an amateur sanctioning
8	organization within the state of South
9	Carolina. We have been approved before, I
10	think through UMMAF. We have a board that has
11	been placed our current board stands with
12	and I'll if you want, you can definitely
13	visit our website to look at the board members
14	that are listed. I'll try not to take up the
15	board's time with all of their bios, but we are
16	made up of a committee that has five nominating
17	and governing committee members, five audit
18	committee members, five ethics committee
19	members, five judicial committee members, and
20	five appeal committee members. Our board
21	itself is made up of ten board members. That
22	includes two athletic directors, an independent
23	director, a general membership director, and a
24	director of an affiliated organization. We
25	also have one director that's representing for

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1	the amateur fighters themselves, and then a
2	director that is a member of not only USFMMA,
3	but also a current member of IMMAF, which is
4	the International Mixed Martial Arts
5	Federation. We have advisory councils that are
6	set up that are members much like the position
7	that Will will be filling going forward with
8	the South Carolina Athletic Commission. And
9	we've separated the U.S. up into eight regions.
10	Those regions have a representative of the
11	athletic field within each state well,
12	within each region that will cover and be a
13	point of contact for all of our fighters. As
14	we've mentioned before on previous board
15	members, the purpose of our organization is to
16	allow staff, as well as rural meetings to be
17	held that will eliminate I guess the additional
18	finances from the board, from the South
19	Carolina Athletic Commission. So our job is
20	not to completely take over. The South
21	Carolina Athletic Commission will still be a
22	representative at all of the events, but we
23	would be the sanctioning body that would do the
24	results. Fighters have an opportunity to
25	create a membership which gives them voting

1	rights within our organization as well. But
2	all of the funding for licensing still goes
3	back to the athletic commission.
4	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Good.
5	MS. WILLIAMS: And I have to apologize for fumbling in
6	the beginning. Justin was supposed to be here
7	to do this, so
8	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Yeah, I know the feeling. So
9	MS. WILLIAMS: I'm so sorry. And it's like I know
10	this, but at the same time I was newly
11	appointed to the position so I'm learning all
12	the ins and outs of the organization. I know
13	how combat sports work. I've not only worked
14	with combat sports in the private sector, but
15	I've had the pleasure of working with combat
16	sports with the South Carolina Athletic
17	Commission. So that's what made me the best
18	fit candidate to take on this responsibility as
19	the executive director. Not only that, but
20	also the relationships that I have within the
21	fight community, as well as with the
22	commissions, not just in South Carolina, but
23	throughout the U.S.
24	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Okay. Well, thank you for your
25	time, for speaking and coming and filling in

1 for Justin. I don't know if we have -- well, Ι 2 should -- discussion then. 3 MR. D'ANDREA: Well, I just have a question. You said 4 that this organization was approved before by, 5 I didn't hear who that was. 6 MS. WILLIAMS: Well, there was a board meeting that 7 was held to approve for sanctioning 8 organizations to be able to come before the 9 board to request to be an authorized 10 sanctioning body within the state for amateur 11 mixed martial arts. 12 MR. D'ANDREA: And that came before the athletic 13 commission? 14 MS. WILLIAMS: Correct. 15 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: And I think Mr. McCullough can 16 probably shed some light on that. 17 MR. McCULLOUGH: If I may? So a while back, as a 18 board we voted on and approved the concept of 19 allowing reputable third-party sanctioning 20 bodies to sanction amateur MMA events in the 21 state of South Carolina. And when we did that 22 it was specifically because the only entity at 23 that time that was doing it was UMMAF. MS. WILLIAMS: Correct. 24 25 MR. McCULLOUGH: So we, one, said that's okay; and

1	two, said UMMAF could do that. But looking
2	forward, not to show favoritism because of only
3	one body being able to do that, we did say if
4	another reputable third-party entity ever came
5	into the state and wanted to do that, they
6	would just have come before the board and get
7	our approval to do the same. And so what I
8	don't let me put words in your mouth, but what
9	my, as an advisor, opinion is is that you are
10	probably here today for the purpose of seeking
11	that approval
12	MS. WILLIAMS: That's correct.
13	MR. McCULLOUGH: from the board to be approved as
14	a third-party sanctioning body for amateur MMA
15	in the state of South Carolina, just like the
16	board had done for UMMAF?
17	MS. WILLIAMS: Correct.
18	
19	MR. McCULLOUGH: So that being the fact, if it was

1		this, is to do what you've already done with
2		UMMAF for this entity. Does that answer
3	MR.	D'ANDREA: Well, what happened to it? I mean, if
4		it was approved.
5	MR.	McCULLOUGH: It was approved, it's just a
6		different organization.
7	MR.	D'ANDREA: Okay. All right.
8	MR.	McCULLOUGH: And they want to do the same thing.
9	MR.	D' ANDREA: Okay.
10	MR.	BATES: And you say UMMAF, U-M-A-F?
11	MR.	McCULLOUGH: U-M-M-A-F.
12	MS.	WILLIAMS: U-M-M-A-F.
13	MR.	McCULLOUGH: UMMAF is the one that we previously
14		approved.
15	MS.	WILLIAMS: United States Mixed Martial Arts
16		Foundation.
17	MR.	McCULLOUGH: USFMMA, which is who you now
18		represent, is asking to do the same thing. Not
19		that I'm privy to the history of it, but a lot
20		of the individuals and players in that initial
21		organization have shifted and created this new
22		one as it's their opinion it allows comparable
23		service in a better way. So a lot of the same
24		players, same idea, my recommendation as an
25		advisor would be that you consider allowing
	•	

1	them that same opportunity to do so. And you
2	can do that, unless counsel disagrees with me,
3	via vote today if you so choose to do so.
4	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: We just have to make a motion.
5	But the other question is too and I'm not
6	knocking I know you said it had to do with a
7	qualified entity. Have we qualified what
8	qualifications did we meet last time in order
9	to make that a
10	MR. McCULLOUGH: It's my personal opinion that this
11	particular entity is every bit as qualified, if
12	not hypothetically more than the one you've
13	already approved.
14	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: That's what I'm getting at.
15	MS. WILLIAMS: If you will allow me to, I'd like to
16	share just how qualified we are. Our board, as
17	I mentioned, is made up of ten board members:
18	Dominick Cruz; Dr. Ari Kramer, who is a member
19	of Fight Doctors; Duke Roufus, who is a
20	fighter; Fonti Kandaris, who is not only an
21	athlete, but she also works with IMMAF; Giorgio
22	Boscolo, he's a board member; Justin Brown;
23	Orlando Jimenez is our chair; and Ralph Cook is
24	a board member. And Ralph Cook had six years'
25	experience prior working with ISKA as a state

1	director, as well as working with UMMAF. He's
2	not only one of the board directors, but he
3	also sits on our advisory counsel. Through all
4	of the members of our board, as well as members
5	of our advisory counsel, our ethics committee,
6	our judicial committee, we've got a great deal
7	of members that have experience working with
8	Bellator, ISKA, IMMAF, and working with the
9	IOC, which is the International Olympic
10	Committee. So we have a fully capable and
11	competent group of people that are working with
12	this organization. So they have done a
13	tremendous job thus far with pulling together
14	everyone that represents not only the fighters
15	but the organization respectfully and being
16	sure that we are going to be respected, not
17	only within each of our respective states, but
18	also with the International Olympic Committee
19	and the International Mixed Martial Arts
20	Federation.
21	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Sure. And I didn't mean you were
22	not qualified.
23	MS. WILLIAMS: Not at all.
24	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: I just wanted to make sure that as
25	long as we're approving it, that we're making

1 sure that everybody --2 MS. WILLIAMS: Absolutely. 3 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: -- you know, that the credentials are there and everyone is gualified. 4 5 MS. WILLIAMS: Absolutely. 6 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: And it obviously sounds that that 7 is the case. And that being the case, I would 8 mirror or would I guess --9 MR. McCULLOUGH: If I can add just one last piece of 10 information for the board. 11 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Yes. 12 MR. McCULLOUGH: The individual that came and 13 presented in front of the board for UMMAFF, the 14 original organization, for them to be approved 15 by the board, was Mr. Justin Brown. Mr. Justin 16 Brown is the person who is, via proxy, asking 17 for it for this organization. It's -- I don't 18 want to say it's the same people, but ___ 19 MR. BATES: I've got a question. What's the 20 difference -- or, what's for Justin bringing 21 that on, and what's the desire from leaving 22 that, that he worked hard to bring, to now 23 creating another one? What's the good and bad 24 of him doing that? 25 MS. WILLIAMS: Well, there really is not a good and

1	bad. To be honest, all of us do this job
2	because we love the sport. We have a passion
3	for it. We've been in it. Many of us are
4	volunteering our time; and not just time, but
5	our finances, our energy, and we're doing it
6	because it's right for the fighters. We want
7	to see the sport grow and we want to see it
8	respected because, again, we have a passion for
9	it. Justin, at the time that he was involved
10	with UMMAF, he believed in the vision that the
11	organization was taking. And I can't speak for
12	Justin, I just know that at the time that
13	USFMMA began to form, that organization was
14	created because there were some things within
15	UMMAF that he felt personally didn't
16	appropriately represent the fighters the way
17	that he felt that they should. The direction
18	that he wanted the organization to go, there
19	was no way for that to happen within where he
20	was, and so this organization was created. And
21	not only is it a lot of what UMMAF what he
22	presented when he came to the board for UMMAF,
23	but it also gives the fighters an opportunity
24	to have a voice. And that's why all of the
25	advisory councils were created in order to

1	appropriately support these fighters. None of
2	us would be here if it weren't for them. And
3	so we want to make sure that they have proper
4	representation and that we're giving them an
5	opportunity to have a voice in the changes that
6	are going to ultimately affect them with
7	competing. I'm sorry. Did I answer your
8	question?
9	MR. BATES: Perfectly.
10	MS. WILLIAMS: Wonderful, thank you.
11	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Thank you, ma'am.
12	MR. HORNER: From a legal standpoint, has there ever
13	been the requirement that they fill out any
14	paperwork or
15	MR. THOMPSON: If I'm not mistaken, I think there was
16	from the UMMAF, there was a document that we
17	produced for them, but I think it was more I
18	was thinking for an event or something like
19	that.
20	MR. HORNER: Okay.
21	MR. THOMPSON: A period of time.
22	MR. HORNER: But not
23	MR. THOMPSON: I think it was like they were given a
24	period of time, either one year or can you
25	elaborate?

1	MR. McCULLOUGH: Yes. So hypothetically the chair, if
2	the chair obviously could ask if there was a
3	motion to approve the USI forget my acronym,
4	this organization
5	MS. WILLIAMS: USFMMA.
6	MR. McCULLOUGH: as a third-party sanctioning body
7	for amateur MMA in the state of South Carolina
8	for a term of one year. And then any of these
9	third-party entities would just have to come
10	back after a year and reapply to get a
11	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: So the chair is asking, is there a
12	motion that USFMMA is a third-body sanctioning
13	party for a term of one year in South Carolina?
14	MR. D'ANDREA: Do we I'll make a motion here in a
15	minute. Do we have like documentation of your
16	board members and all that?
17	MR. THOMPSON: No, this well, this is the first
18	time they're presenting it to
19	MR. D'ANDREA: Could you send Eric some
20	MS. WILLIAMS: Absolutely.
21	MR. D'ANDREA: Just so we have it on file?
22	MS. WILLIAMS: Absolutely.
23	MR. D'ANDREA: That we, you know, have people's names
24	and
25	MS. WILLIAMS: Yes, I can email a copy of

1 MR. D'ANDREA: -- and kind of your mission, what you 2 want to accomplish? 3 MS. WILLIAMS: Absolutely. All of this information, I will definitely send a copy of -- I'll have to 4 5 I guess pull everything from our website. Our 6 website is completely up and running, and it 7 has a list of all of our committee members, 8 board members, advisory council members, as 9 well as their bios and their experience within 10 combat sports. 11 MR. D'ANDREA: I just think that would be good for us 12 to have. But I'll make the motion to approve -13 14 MR. BATES: I got a guestion. 15 MR. D'ANDREA: I'm sorry. Go ahead. 16 MR. BATES: My lack of understanding and being the new 17 guy, when people bring something to vote on do 18 you have to wait to vote until the next 19 meeting, or do you give the committee time to, 20 hey, look it up, learn about it, read about it 21 and form a better opinion, versus just hearing 22 her speak? 23 MR. HORNER: Typically the boards can do two or three 24 or even four things. The first one is you do 25 have the right to vote upon it. They are

1 properly here before y'all. They do have a 2 request under the New Business section. So if 3 y'all felt strongly enough about the meeting the criteria, then someone could make a motion 4 5 to accept them and it would go through the 6 process of a second and then everybody vote. 7 The second thing you can do is you can -- if 8 you decide there is more information that vou 9 need that's crucial to the decision, and that 10 information wasn't provided to you, you can 11 accept the information given to you as 12 information and request that they come back to 13 the next board meeting with a list of 14 additional information. Maybe you wanted to 15 see their financial records or maybe you wanted 16 to see if any of their fighters ever got 17 murdered or -- murdered is not a good word, 18 killed in the ring, or whether or not, you 19 know, what -- just things about their past that 20 you have a specific concern about because you 21 don't know enough about them. You accept what they brought you as information; ask them 22 to 23 come back with more information, at which point 24 you could then take a vote. Or you could take 25 a vote right now and say your being granted

1	this is conditioned upon your producing to us
2	in the next 15 days all the names of the board
3	of directors and other information off the
4	website. And that way, it's conditionalized
5	and it doesn't take effect until they get it in
6	to you. But the vote is done, so once Eric
7	certifies "I got their information" the
8	positive vote becomes a binding vote.
9	MR. McCULLOUGH: But it's subject to, if I may, it's
10	subject to like Bill had asked for this
11	information. In that case, what we would
12	historically not just this situation, but we
13	would often do is we'd because there is such
14	a huge pause in between these meetings,
15	hypothetically the board would vote to approve
16	this subject to the information that they said
17	they would get.
18	MR. BATES: That makes sense.
19	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Whatever stipulations and
20	MR. McCULLOUGH: And that would play out in a
21	cornucopia of different scenarios.
22	MR. BATES: I just don't want to not vote or vote and
23	we've got the big event coming up and they're
24	not able to help.
25	MR. McCULLOUGH: One thing I would mention, as a

1	commissioner, always vote your conscience. You
2	never should feel pressured to make a vote a
3	certain way. You're here because you've shown
4	sound judgment to somebody.
5	MR. D'ANDREA: And this is only for one year, correct?
6	MR. HORNER: It is for
7	MR. D'ANDREA: You'll have to come back, Diane, right?
8	MS. WILLIAMS: Yes, we'll have to come back next year.
9	We're prepared to do that. We've already
10	worked several events already so, of course,
11	after a year you'll see much more of us. But,
12	you know, we definitely, as with every other
13	state that we've been to to present, we
14	requested that they kind of, you know, check
15	our website, follow us on social media. Many
16	of our board members are involved in athletics
17	anyway so they are followers of our sites. And
18	I'd also like to mention that we do have
19	Bellator, UFC, and there's one other
20	organization that's slipping my mind right now,
21	that's already on board working with us with
22	their amateur fighters. So we are not just
23	seeking that from the board, we are actually
24	we have larger promotion companies that are
25	supporting us wholeheartedly, so.

1	MR. HORNER: Like, in the dental board you'll get
2	some dentist practice will want to try
3	something brand new, never been done before,
4	using nitrous oxide in some way, and they'll
5	develop a policy and it'll have it will be
6	it will have 30 percent of the information.
7	Well, the dental board is never going to accept
8	just knowing 30 percent of the information, so
9	they they'll accept it, send them back, say
10	we'll see you in two months, and they've got to
11	come back. And if they are at 70 percent,
12	they've got to go back again. And so that
13	in those situations, mainly where you're
14	dealing with health issues the nurses are
15	the same way when they want to try things
16	differently, but everybody is really cautious
17	about it and you're not just looking for a
18	piece of information, you're looking for a
19	wealth of information to round it out. That's
20	when you would typically accept their
21	information as information, dictate to you when
22	they want to see them back to continue the
23	process of getting licensed. But in cases like
24	this, it happens all the time, an applicant
25	hasn't didn't send in an order from Georgia

1 where they got disciplined as a nurse, and we 2 say send that in, upon receipt you'll be 3 licensed and --MR. BATES: So we can vote and approve them and then 4 5 say, hey, send us information? 6 MR. HORNER: Correct. And you can condition that --7 upon receiving the information in 30 days, or 8 whatever time frame y'all want to create, 9 whenever she thinks she can get it to you, that 10 kind of thing. 11 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: And we do approve a lot of things 12 and add stipulations to them. 13 MR. BATES: Yeah, that makes sense now. 14 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: So that we can progress along SO 15 long as the information comes back. 16 MR. BATES: That's good with me. 17 MR. D'ANDREA: I think we commend you for the 18 MS. WILLIAMS: Sorry. I'm going to grab a pen because 19 I feel like you guys are going to ask me to do 20 something. I'm listening, thank you. 21 MR. THOMPSON: Mr. Chair, if possible, I just want to 22 ask a question. 23 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Yes. 24 MR. THOMPSON: So if I'm understanding you guys, you 25 said the purpose of the organization is to

1	allow the amateur fighters to compete at an
2	Olympic level, be safe, but be the sanctioning
3	body. So you would work with the commission,
4	but what does that look like? I mean, in terms
5	of what are you guys going to do? Are y'all
6	going to provide
7	MS. WILLIAMS: We provide all the officials and, of
8	course, the staff is provided from is
9	provided by the promoter. But as far as the
10	judges and the officials that the referees
11	that are there, we provide that. So that's an
12	expense that the commission no longer has to
13	bear. With assigning and checking
14	qualifications, that's of course the part that
15	we actually do. With amateur kickboxing and
16	let me just briefly say this: Amateur mixed
17	martial arts began to be regulated because it
18	was a sport that was not being regulated and
19	pro MMA was approved. Amateur kickboxing is
20	currently not regulated by the South Carolina
21	Athletic Commission. Amateur boxing is
22	currently not regulated by the South Carolina
23	Amateur Commission or, Athletic Commission.
24	And the reason for that is because the way that
25	the sport is regulated or not that it's

1	regulated, but the way that the sport is run is
2	completely different. Amateur fighters can be
3	of any age; and so when you have amateur
4	fighters that are being held to the same
5	standards as a pro, it gets to be a little
6	confusing. Just in my experience, there needs
7	to be a separation at some point of regulation.
8	And amateur fighters are able to be placed into
9	a contract. They are already being paid, they
10	are paying licensing fees. With amateur
11	fighters they are not receiving a purse. The
12	way that they train is differently. And many
13	times, like for instance with South Carolina,
14	amateur mixed martial arts fighters have to
15	have minimum of six bouts and a 75 percent win
16	in order to compete as a pro. But they're
17	still being they still have to pay the same
18	licensing fees as a pro pays. And they also
19	don't have the same opportunities to compete.
20	And so in order for them to get any type of
21	recognition within their sport, they have to
22	pretty much switch over to become a pro
23	fighter. Well, a lot of amateur fighters we
24	have I work in amateur boxing as well. A
25	lot of amateur fighters, they and, Andrew,

1	I'd probably ask you, if that's okay, to kind
2	of what's the longest record or the longest
3	fight time that you've had for an amateur
4	boxer?
5	MR. STOKES: I don't understand. What do you mean?
6	MS. WILLIAMS: So you have for the amateur boxers,
7	many of them decide to just stay as a amateur
8	fighter. What's the longest career for an
9	amateur fighter?
10	MR. STOKES: Oh. We have some that never turn pro.
11	MS. WILLIAMS: So what's the longest record, the
12	longest fight career that you've seen?
13	MR. STOKES: I don't know. We have guys right now
14	competing in amateur boxing that are 48 years
15	old.
16	MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. So the reason that I asked him
17	that is because that would be unheard of for an
18	amateur mixed martial arts fighter. With our
19	amateur boxers, they have an opportunity to
20	fight state championships, regional
21	championships, and Golden Gloves. And then
22	they also have Olympic or, regional
23	championships for the Olympics. They don't
24	have that opportunity with MMA as an amateur
25	fighter. And the reason is because there is no

1	organization that supports them. So they have
2	no outlet other than going pro and hoping to
3	get the recognition of fighting on a larger
4	promotion company such as UFC or Bellator. And
5	so USF organizations like USFMMA, our goal
6	is to help these fighters to have a safe
7	playing field exactly like they have with ISKA
8	or USA Boxing. We want to provide that for
9	them, and there is nothing like that now. So
10	again to answer your question, you know I
11	think if I remember correctly, your question
12	was what
13	MR. THOMPSON: So all y'all need from us is licenses?
14	To be there to license
15	MS. WILLIAMS: We will be there to license and provide
16	the officials.
17	MR. THOMPSON: And to just
18	MS. WILLIAMS: Correct. Correct. We also have
19	someone there that will do all the rules
20	meetings and basically all of the
21	responsibilities that the athletic commission
22	would have. We only take care of that for the
23	amateur fighters.
24	MR. THOMPSON: So just like the UFC, you guys would
1	oversight to ensure that the officials are
----	---
2	doing what they are supposed to do?
3	MS. WILLIAMS: Absolutely. Absolutely.
4	MR. McCULLOUGH: May I interject for one moment?
5	MS. WILLIAMS: Yes.
6	MR. McCULLOUGH: On this topic, you had mentioned,
7	accurately, so South Carolina does not regulate
8	or oversee amateur boxing.
9	MS. WILLIAMS: Correct.
10	MR. McCULLOUGH: We also don't regulate or oversee
11	amateur kickboxing.
12	MS. WILLIAMS: Correct.
13	MR. McCULLOUGH: We do however, via regulations,
14	oversee and regulate amateur MMA.
15	MS. WILLIAMS: Correct.
16	MR. McCULLOUGH: So whether or not one personally
17	agrees with that or not, it is the way it's
18	written.
19	MS. WILLIAMS: That's correct.
20	MR. McCULLOUGH: So as a board, you have the
21	obligation to stay within the framework of
22	those regulations. So, correct me if I'm
23	wrong, but what you are asking for via this
24	isn't to suddenly start holding amateur events
25	all across the state without the state's

1	involvement. The state still needs to be
2	involved, as per our regulations, at every
3	level. This just eliminates the degree of the,
4	quote, heavy lifting?
5	MS. WILLIAMS: Correct.
6	MR. McCULLOUGH: But at any point where state
7	regulations are in conflict with what your
8	entity is doing, state regulations trump that
9	because we do regulate amateur MMA, whether
10	that's a pro or a con. So because this is a
11	new thing for the state, even though UMMAF got
12	promoted got approved, I don't believe they
13	ever actually had a show yet. So this is still
14	a little bit inventing the wheel. So my
15	recommendation would be, if y'all there is
16	going to be some growing pain on that, and I
17	would caution there being caution on the
18	side of work with staff in making sure that
19	first hypothetical event goes the way it's
20	supposed to and the state isn't just washing
21	their hands of it, they're not. It's just
22	where there's the state is still involved,
23	just they are eliminating a degree of the heavy
24	lifting to increase the volume of amateur
25	shows. But if there is one pro card on that,

1 all bets are changed and they now have to start 2 -- so that's just random --3 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: And I think that's why we 4 initially approved UMMAF with just -- because 5 of that, because we couldn't help with that --6 the big picture I guess, and they were doing 7 the heavy lifting as you say. So it's -- I 8 think it's a win-win to have them on board to 9 help with this. 10 MR. McCULLOUGH: Yeah, if there's any amateur boxing 11 event, a Golden Gloves, the state's not 12 involved in that at all, I mean -- but we are 13 involved in amateur MMA via regulations. So 14 you can't shirk that, you still have to do 15 everything the state has to do for that, just 16 they're taking over parts of that to encourage 17 more growth for amateur to remain in the state. 18 If that makes sense. 19 MS. WILLIAMS: And it also cuts down on, you know, 20 typically with an amateur show the state would 21 have to have, not just assign the officials to 22 be -- for judges and referees, but you'd also 23 be responsible for bringing staff to work that 24 event. We cover that. So that would no longer 25 be an expense of the athletic commission. Of

1	course, you still have to have a representative
2	there
3	MR. THOMPSON: A representative, uh-huh.
4	MS. WILLIAMS: because based on the statute and
5	regulations it's still sanctioned by the
6	athletic commission. But us being there would
7	eliminate you would only need to send one
8	representative as opposed to what I've noticed
9	at recent shows, there's anywhere from six to
10	eight people. So there would no longer be a
11	need to do that because USFMMA would provide
12	all of the staff in order to take care of all
13	the responsibilities at the event. And we have
14	currently done the kickboxing events and Muay
15	Thai. So we had an event on
16	MR. STOKES: March 30th.
17	MS. WILLIAMS: March 30th, thank you. And we'll also
18	be sanctioning the event on June 15th.
19	MR. McCULLOUGH: So to clarify for the board, they are
20	already sanctioning amateur kickboxing events
21	in the state. Also keep in mind that
22	ultimately fighter safety and all that
23	MR. THOMPSON: Right.
24	MR. McCULLOUGH: with amateur MMA rests on the
25	board. So you can't shirk that. This is just

1	allowing it to evolve into what ten years from
2	now will probably be them doing their own
3	thing, just like boxing or whatever. Our
4	regulations don't support that. I'll shut up.
5	Thank you.
6	MR. THOMPSON: I think that's I mean, for the most
7	part I understand what she's saying. It really
8	comes down to saving costs for the amateurs.
9	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Yeah.
10	MR. THOMPSON: From what I can see just on this. But
11	she's right, we have had additional staff but
12	they would not charge for additional staff. So
13	we've had folks there but they don't charge.
14	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Okay. Any more questions? Any
15	discussion?
16	COMMISSION: (No response.)
17	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: That being said, I'll put forth
18	again then if there is a motion as to USFMMA?
19	MR. D'ANDREA: I'll make the motion to approve it
20	pending on the information sent to Eric. I've
21	done I don't know what time frame you
22	MS. WILLIAMS: I can have it to you by the end of the
23	day today.
24	MR. THOMPSON: What time frame you guys set.
25	MR. D'ANDREA: Well, yeah.

1	MR. THOMPSON: It's what you set.
2	MR. D'ANDREA: Oh, yeah. So in ten days or whatever.
3	MS. WILLIAMS: Yeah.
4	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: So the motion is made. Is there a
5	second?
6	DR. VAUGHT: This is Dillon, I'll second.
7	MR. BATES: Do we need to clarify what she needs to
8	send us, or does she already know what
9	MS. WILLIAMS: I actually want to clarify that. The
10	only thing y'all previously mentioned was that
11	you wanted the bios for the board members.
12	MR. D'ANDREA: Well, I think if you could send us, you
13	know, you talked about safety, you probably
14	have some bylaws.
15	MS. WILLIAMS: Our bylaws, yes. They are available as
16	well.
17	MR. D'ANDREA: I would send everything that your
18	organization has put together.
19	MS. WILLIAMS: Okay.
20	MR. D'ANDREA: I understand your intent, and I think
21	it's good promotion for what we're trying to
22	do. I just think it would be prudent for us to
23	have that information documented.
24	MS. WILLIAMS: Absolutely. So just to clarify, you'd
25	like a copy of the bylaws as well as $$

1 MR. D'ANDREA: The board members --2 MS. WILLIAMS: -- the bios for all board members. 3 MR. D'ANDREA: And your mission, your visions, whatever your, you know, whatever you --4 5 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. 6 MR. BATES: And then potential responsibilities that 7 y'all are helping with these fights. I think 8 you said the board doesn't have to have a 9 certain amount of people. You know, what are 10 the responsibilities y'all are trying to help 11 alleviate at these events or cover? 12 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. 13 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: And let me clarify the motion and 14 make it ten days. 15 MR. D'ANDREA: Okay. 16 CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Instead of an open end. 17 MR. D'ANDREA: I'll make the motion to approve that 18 pending on the information we receive within a 19 ten-day period 20 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. 21 MR. D'ANDREA: Okay. 22 MS. WILLIAMS: And can I confirm one more time please? 23 MR. D'ANDREA: Sure. 24 MS. WILLIAMS: So you need a copy of our mission, our 25 responsibilities at the events, our bylaws, and

2	correct?
3	MR. D'ANDREA: Kind of concise bios I think would be
4	fine. And your purpose.
5	MS. WILLIAMS: Okay.
6	MR. D'ANDREA: You know, why you exist.
7	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: And, Dillon, you still seconded
8	that motion; is that correct?
9	DR. VAUGHT: Yeah, pending all that information.
10	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: All those in favor?
11	COMMISSION: Aye.
12	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Any opposed?
13	COMMISSION: (No response.)
14	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Hearing none, the motion passes.
15	MS. WILLIAMS: Thank you so much.
16	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Thank you for coming today.
17	MS. WILLIAMS: Thank you.
18	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: What is next? Mr. Oxendine. Are
19	you still on the line with us?
20	MR. OXENDINE: I am here, yes, sir.
21	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Fantastic. Well, you're up next,
22	team MMA. You have the floor, sir.
23	MR. OXENDINE: Okay. So, yes, I just wanted to touch
24	base with the commission, based on I'll give
25	a little bit of history about the team MMA

1	sports, that's what we're there for, so you're
2	going to be very aware. So we first approached
3	the South Carolina Athletic Commission in late
4	2014, early 2015. We actually held an
5	unsanctioned event in Virginia, which was
6	legal, but we invited there was no way to
7	sanction it. There was no body that would
8	that could do it. So we invited all regional
9	athletic commissions within the area. This was
10	in Virginia, so we invited Tennessee, Georgia,
11	South Carolina, North Carolina. South Carolina
12	did attend. And from that point we began the
13	process to sanction in the state of South
14	Carolina. So after working approximately a
15	year, speaking with the commission, with you
16	guys, we were able to hold our first event in
17	September of 2015. That was in Myrtle Beach.
18	That was Arena Combat. Then following that we
19	had more meetings and discussions. There were
20	some revisions to the rules, which brought it
21	to the current state of rules for the state of
22	South Carolina with team MMA where it is
23	involved. It provided a provisional three-
24	event allowance. Basically we would hold three
25	events, and those were probationary. And after

1	each one there would be a meeting to discuss
2	the rules and so forth. So we, following that
3	we held another event in January of 2017, and
4	so that would have been the first probationary
5	event. We would now hold two. Of course, it's
6	a growing sport, with a lot of combat sports
7	kind of that are alternative combat sports
8	sort of on the rise. We, you know, we were in
9	the development process of, you know, funding
10	it, that sort of thing. It's very expensive
11	for a lot of the equipment and the arena and
12	that sort of thing, the cage that is involved.
13	And so we are there was a we continued to
14	work, but there was a recent surge in the sport
15	in particular. I know that Joe Rogan actually
16	re-tweeted it, and so there has been a huge
17	outcry for the return and so, you know, we
18	would be in the process of constructing a new
19	facility or a new cage for this event. And so
20	we're wanting to reach out to the athletic
21	commission again and discuss, you know, the
22	second probationary event of the three. Make
23	sure that that's going to be permitted under
24	the terms and the rules that we currently have
25	discussed and, you know, just get the ball

1	rolling to expand on this sport, which is
2	you know, we've held two sanctioned events
3	there, they've been successful and, you know,
4	touch base with you guys and see where we go
5	from there.
6	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Okay. And I appreciate you being
7	with us today. And I think this we are
8	probably going to have more discussion about it
9	I guess. I do recall the very first bout in
10	Myrtle Beach. It was something different for
11	sure. I know it's changed some over time, but
12	to get some of the other board members up to
13	speed and maybe refer to counsel on some of
14	this information. I don't Will, I don't
15	know how we left it with it's been
16	MR. McCULLOUGH: Well, if I may. I honestly
17	personally don't recall how we left it off the
18	top of my head. I mean, we had am I
19	correct, Casey, in saying so you had two
20	events; is that right?
21	MR. OXENDINE: We did, yes. Two sanctioned events
22	with South Carolina.
23	MR. McCULLOUGH: And just for clari
24	MR. OXENDINE: The first one yes, after the first
25	one we, we I re-approached the commission

1	with you guys and was provided three additional
2	probationary events, which we held one other,
3	which was Team MMA Battle with the newest
4	revised rule set. Which was, you know, put in
5	place you know, the first event had elevated
6	obstacles; these new rules would eliminate the
7	elevated obstacles and just basically put this
8	in a place with a two-on-two bout in a in an
9	arena which could have those obstacles. In
10	other words, you couldn't climb on and ascend
11	them, but you could move throughout them in a
12	maze situation. And so and, of course, we
13	have the rules, the current rules, you know,
14	that we could provide the commission to oversee
15	and take a look at.
16	MR. McCULLOUGH: Casey? Casey?
17	MR. OXENDINE: So what we did is we held the second
18	event, and then we approached you guys. And
19	that would have been the last meeting that we
20	had, was directly following the last event,
21	which was actually about four to five months
22	after I believe there was something with the
23	flooding that occurred there, and we weren't
24	able to directly have a meeting. And so it
25	was, I think it was probably about mid-2017 if

1	I would guess
2	MR. McCULLOUGH: Casey? Casey?
3	MR. OXENDINE: the last time we spoke.
4	MR. McCULLOUGH: Since you're on the line, and I'm not
5	in a position to ask this since I'm not the
6	chair, but I would I would ask personally,
7	just when you go off on a monologue, give it a
8	pause every so often in case somebody wants to
9	chime in. I mean that with all respect, but
10	just the logistics of it are difficult.
11	Anyhow, just a a point of education for
12	everybody on the board, may I ask respectfully
13	in kind of a concise way, what is what is
14	your motivation if you ruled the world, what
15	is your motivation for this presentation today?
16	Are you seeking a vote on having an upcoming
17	event soon, or did you just want to re-visit it
18	to kind of take the temperature of where we
19	stand? What's your what's your ideal
20	motivation for the outcome of what we're doing
21	right now?
22	MR. OXENDINE: Another event soon. I have investors
23	that are willing to help us construct the new
24	cage, which is a much more it's much easier
25	to facilitate, to transport, to construct, and

1	so forth.
2	MR. McCULLOUGH: May I
3	MR. OXENDINE: So we would look at something in late
4	2019, early 2020, is what we were hoping for.
5	MR. McCULLOUGH: Okay. So you answered what would
6	have been my personal follow-up question, which
7	was the timeline that you were thinking of. If
8	I might just make a recommendation to all
9	involved in my position of not-a-position.
10	There is a lot of moving parts on this. We did
11	have two events. There's questions that came
12	up. But with the exception of myself, who is
13	no longer involved, there's no one that was
14	involved in that. And because it does include
15	not just a potential for more risk, but at
16	least the illusion of more risk, essentially
17	what is being proposed is it's an MMA fight
18	that's two-on-two, at the same time. It was
19	exciting. There was concerns. But there is
20	also ways to potentially alleviate that. You
21	know, we're a fairly progressive board in
22	allowing some trying something. If the
23	board wanted to look into considering this, I
24	think there probably needs to be a period of
25	new education of the board on this topic. I

1	think it would involve coming in, seeing fight
2	clips, really everybody around this table with
3	the exception well, that's not true, Mack was
4	at that too, but I just
5	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: I was.
6	MR. McCULLOUGH: I would I'm not saying gaff this
7	or disregard it, I'm also saying my advice
8	would be to not stamp something yet today. I
9	think for the good of everybody involved, all
10	of y'all probably need to learn more about this
11	and work with Casey. I don't know if there is
12	an answer in there. I mean I well, I'm
13	being redundant now. I'm wishing that you
14	could have possibly I know that's
15	logistically not feasible, but it would be
16	great for you to be able to be here and show
17	clips and really educate these board members on
18	what it is you're proposing. And I don't know
19	if there is a path forward that's logistically
20	easy for that to happen in a more timely manner
21	for y'all. I just wanted to pipe in and kind
22	of explain what it is. It's two-on-two MMA in
23	a just a new format. And we've done it
24	before.
25	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Mr. McCullough's remarks, I think

1	he's correct. We probably do need some more
2	discussion on it, Casey. We're not I hope
3	it doesn't sound like we're kicking the can
4	down the road, but just to give us a little
5	more time to get acclimated to what you're
6	to what you're proposing I guess. So I would
7	ask that you give us a little time to discuss
8	it as a board and come up with an idea that we
9	could get back together with you, hopefully
10	within your time frame, to see what we can do.
11	MR. OXENDINE: Okay. Yeah, that sounds great. In
12	that regard, should we, of course, do have a
13	lot of paperwork, we also have a lot of video
14	that we can provide and that sort of thing.
15	You know, is that something that, you know, I
16	should go ahead and provide to you guys, that
17	way maybe leading up to the next meeting you
18	will be prepared? I just actually finished an
19	event on Friday night there in Little River,
20	South Carolina. I was the matchmaker for that,
21	and I partnered with Don Ketner who promoted
22	that, so I was pretty, pretty covered up. And
23	that's why I didn't end up there today, because
24	I've been on the road, you know, a whole lot
25	with this last event which, you know, had a lot

1	of moving parts as well. If you would provide
2	me what, you know, how you would like me to
3	provide this information. And if you do have a
4	sort of timeline, when you would want to re-
5	visit, and that way I can be prepared to
6	provide you any information that you need.
7	(Crosstalk)
8	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: videos type thing.
9	MR. D'ANDREA: Yeah.
10	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Is there videos of the previous
11	fights that you could send?
12	MR. OXENDINE: Yes, of course. Absolutely.
13	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Okay.
14	MR. OXENDINE: And also I believe Mr. McCullough was
15	in attendance and, of course, Mr. Shoemake, who
16	both again are no longer there. I'm sure that
17	once we provide all of that, then Mr.
18	McCullough would be able to provide some of his
19	insight as well in detail whenever we
20	MR. McCULLOUGH: Hey, Casey?
21	MR. OXENDINE: we do re-visit.
22	MR. McCULLOUGH: Casey, if I may just make a
23	suggestion because, once again, it's just
24	once again, it's not to be like kicking this
25	can, but at the same point, you know, we've got

1	a lot of folks who are just unfamiliar with
2	what it is you're discussing. If I may make a
3	recommendation to yourself, you might consider
4	just some type of digital package that could
5	educate essentially a layman on exactly what it
6	is you're proposing. A little write-up, this
7	is what team MMA is, here are some video clips
8	from it, here are some things that were said
9	about it. Essentially a promotional package
10	that you could provide the staff, that staff
11	could in turn provide the board so they could
12	at least discuss and debate it, you know, with
13	a foundation of wisdom on what it is they're
14	does that make sense? I would
15	MR. OXENDINE: Sure.
16	MR. McCULLOUGH: I would recommend that you could send
17

16	you for your time today. I appreciate you
17	hanging on through the technical difficulties.
18	MR. OXENDINE: No problem. I appreciate the time with
19	the commission. Thank you so much.
20	CHAIRMAN ESTRIDGE: Thank you. And next I know we've
21	got a slew of age waiver hearings. Can we take
22	like about a ten-minute recess because I need

24	MR. THOMPSON: You're the chair.
