ADVISORY OPINION # 27

QUESTION: Is it within the role and scope of responsibilities of the registered nurse (RN) and licensed practical nurse (LPN) to perform sharps debridement of necrotic tissue as ordered by the physician or APRN?

The State Board of South Carolina acknowledges that it is within the role and scope of responsibility of the selected RN to perform sharps debridement as ordered by the physician or APRN. It is NOT within the role and scope of the LPN to perform sharps debridement.

Recognizing this responsibility is considered an additional act for the RN, the Board recommends the following stipulations:

1. The agency nursing, medical, and administrative departments establish written policies, procedures and/or standing orders addressing:
 - Licensed Provider documentation of evaluation and supporting orders.
 - Licensed Provider is readily available to provide assistance and direction during the performance of the service.
 - Guidelines for dealing with potential complications.
2. The agency documents nurse's successful completion of an organized course of study relative to wound assessment and debridement **techniques**. The course must include didactic classroom instruction followed by a period of supervised clinical instructions including return demonstration and competency evaluation.
3. Competency: The RN must demonstrate competency and document it, including knowledge of infection control procedures, wound etiology, and types of debridement.
4. Facility policy: The facility's policy and procedures must reflect the RN's ability to perform the procedure. Annual competency validation must be documented.

This statement is an advisory opinion of the Board of Nursing as to what constitutes competent and safe nursing practice.
